LEGISLATIVE EXPENSE.

Salem Journal: We trust it shall not be amiss to call attention to the amount of money it takes to keep the records of the legislature in Oregon. The legislature has not increased in numbers or length of sessions.

We find that the senate in 1876 and 1878 employed only two clerks, S. C. Simpson and J. W. Baker, costing \$650 for each session. In 1895 the senate desk clerks cost \$1,455 for one session.

Here are the expenses for clerks and employees (not committee clerks and mileage) for

LEGISLATURE 1895.

Senate employees.....\$2,781 00
House.....2,837 00
Senate record clerks.....1,455 50
House record clerks.....1,613 00
Contrast with ten years ago, \$600 to \$700 for each house! Each house now employs five or six clerks on the records and pays most of them \$10 a day.

The political necessity for employing a large number of persons about a legislature is now seemingly so great that it cost more to REVISE and CORRECT the journals of the legislature in 1895 than it did to keep those journals in 1876 and 1878. We are making progress down hill.

The populists and democrats of Harney county evidently mean business. They held a joint meeting of the two central committees a few days ago, and are arranging a union of forces for the next state campaign.

A New York writer gives the following description of a costume worn by Mrs. William C. Whitney at the opera: "The waist seemed to be literally covered with diamonds and emeralds. A tiara of diamonds and emeralds rested on her coiffure. About her neck was a solid band of diamonds, from which were suspended pendants of diamonds, falling over her shoulders. In the center of the corsage was a diamond star; on either side were other diamond clusters, and suspended from the right shoulder and falling down over the waist was a single string of diamonds of immense size. I don't remember if she wore anything else or not."

Philadelphia Ledger: What is to be done with the vagrants? Shutting them up for the winter in warm jails is exactly what most of them desire, and is a reward rather than a punishment for their offense; while any proposition to set them at work and thus not only recoup the expenses of maintaining them but to make them useful members of society, is sternly opposed by the labor organizations. The depression of labor is making tramps of men who, at the start, would work if they could, but who soon grow fond of living without work, and thus the problem becomes more pressing every day, while no practicable schemes for solving it are being offered.
