RIGHT KIND OF TALK.

At the New England dinner held in the city of New York last week, ex-Minister Phelps was the principal speaker. In the course of his remarks he made use of the following patriotic words and expressions of sentiment to which every patriotic man in the nation will say, amen! Here are the words:

"It seems to me that for a while we have got to suspend the contest of party. We have got to postpone the decision of such issue. There have got to be concessions on all sides and self-denial on all sides. If we do that we may look for prosperity. If we do not I should be glad to be informed, because I am sorry to say that I am unable to see from what quarter it is to come.

"We have got to have the patriotism of the forefathers resurrected; a patriotism that is above party and above self; a patriotism that exists when none were for the party and all were for the state. If this government is as Lincoln said it—a government of the people, for the people and by the people—then it is absolutely certain that it cannot be a government of the politicians, by the politicians, and for the politicians, because no two systems of government are more directly opposed than those."

SHERIDAN'S BEST SPEECH.

"The last time General Phil Sheridan was in Milwaukee," said Bob Howard, the newspaper man, "was when the Army of the Cumberland held its annual reunion here in 1882. A banquet was given the association at the National Home. General Sheridan presided. In his opening speech he was puzzled for words, but after a fashion he managed to stammer out something that but few heard and less understood. I was reporting the event for the Sentinel and had taken down everything Sheridan said just as he spoke it. When he got through he came to me and said: 'Look here, Mr. Reporter, do you want to please me?'"

"'Deed I do, general.'"
 "Then please don't print that d—slush of mine. Just make up a nice little speech for me."

Howard made up a dainty little speech for the commander of the American army, which greatly pleased him.

A few years later, when he was on duty at Washington, Howard's duties frequently took him to headquarters and he always met a hearty welcome. The first time he called Sheridan said: "Oh yes, I remember you. You are the man who made that nice little speech for me in Milwaukee."

On several occasions he introduced Howard to his friends as the author of the best speech he ever made.

Colonel Griffith J. Griffith, a business man of Los Angeles, has given to his beloved city a portion of the Los Feliz rancho, comprising 2000 acres, for a public park. This the largest public park in the world—barring none—is to be connected with Elysian park by a broad boulevard, something over a mile in length. Water rights go with the land, and the entire gift is today worth about \$300,000.

This leads the RedlandsCitrograph to suggest the query. "What will it be worth to the people of Los Angeles ten years hence?" Col. Griffith makes but one stipulation as a "rider" to his gift, and that is that no railroad shall run to this park, chartered by the city, on which a greater fare than five cents shall be charged.

The Ashland Tidings says that it is reported that the fight to secure the relocation of the county seat of Jackson county will be opened by the introduction of a bill at the coming session of the legislature to submit the question to a vote of the people of that county at the next state and county election in June, 1898. The effort to secure a submission of the question to a vote of the people is said to emanate from Medford, with the idea that its location will make Medford a strong competitor with Jacksonville.

Sheep to the Front.

The state of Oregon is situated on the Pacific coast and has a pleasant climate to live in. It is neither too cold or too warm, and thus is suited for pleasant homes, which can be had in our inland cities and villages; and along our clear water brooks and rivers, and along our mountain spurs and foot hills.

These places can be vastly improved by turning their surroundings into tame pastures, which can be made both beautiful and profitable.

This can be done by pasturing sheep and goats on it. They will eat off the wild grass, weeds and shrubbery, and their droppings will enrich the land and prepare it for tame grasses, such as timothy, blue grass and other tame grasses.

Nothing enriches the land so completely as the droppings of these animals.

It will also prepare the land for prune orchards, and that without the expense of plowing or harrowing the ground.

The next legislature should pass a law against the dog nuisance, for they are the only enemies the sheep and goats have near towns and villages.

The law should compel every dog owner to keep up his dog from sunset till sunrise, or be compelled to pay a fine of from five to ten dollars for each offense. To be collected before any justice of the peace, or recorder in the county.

The fine when so collected, to be paid over to the complaining witness, and thus encourage the enforcement of the law.
