MR. SCOTT, BE FAIR.

Salem Journal: "In the Oregonian of January 4th is a scorching arraignment of the fee system in Oregon, and as usual, the whole system is made to center over the head of Secretary Kincaid. He is the only official who is made a target for specific charges, and there is a conspicuous silence about all other officials. Mr. Kincaid is charged with collecting all kinds of fees that he never collects, and that a simple adherence to truth would show he does not receive. If Mr. Scott's paper would be fair about these things it would have far more influence with the people, and help bring out a reform the sooner.

"Such a campaign of reform can only have one result. It will gather all the supporters of the fee system in the legislature around Mr. Kincaid, and, in protecting him against a malevolent personal attack, they will insist that nothing shall be done to abolish the fee system that does not include the governor, treasurer, school superintendent, clerk of the supreme court, the supreme court, etc., etc., and all can see that nothing will come of it, and the big fee-grabbers will escape, while Harvey Scott has wreaked his personal spite on one man he does not like.

"The Oregonian's representative seems to have instructions to dig up all he can to make the secretary offensive to the people, and be silent about all the other abuses. Perhaps that is why never a word appears about the unconstitutional salary and perquisites of the governor and treasurer, and yet they sit on all the boards that Kincaid does, and each draws identically the same pay that Kincaid does. And so on through the list. Harvey Scott's nephew is private secretary to the governor, and gets in addition to his large salary of \$1500 a year, pay as clerk of half a dozen boards, and \$10 a month for merely certifying to a bill for the electric lights. But no one is mean enough to say any of these gentlemen collect their pay and salaries dishonestly or with any diabolical intention to oppress the people. They simply take what the law gives them, and the laws were passed by legislatures completely dominated by Joe Simon, Harvey Scott, and their republican satellites, for the past twenty years. The men who can hold up their hands and say with Thomas Jefferson, they never used their official position for private profit are scarce in these days."

The Dalles Chronicle suggests that the legislature, by way of reform, do away with the supreme court sessions at Pendleton. It says the term was only established there by the legislature to dodge the requirements of the constitution and pay the supreme judges \$1500 per year more than the salary allowed them under the constitution. The decision of the supreme court that all state institutions be located at Salem may possibly apply to the supreme court.

"Don't expect prosperity to come back with a jump," says Major McKinley's personal organ over in

Chicago. "We won't," says the Kansas City Times. "If she enters with a glide, or a three-o'clock-in-the-morning stagger; if she moses in on one leg; nay, if she even chasses backwards on her suncringle, or waltzes gently forward on her ear, we'll welcome her and brush the dust off the best seat in the house for her to sit on. It don't make one dif of bitterness how she comes, but the whyness of her coming is a matter of great interest."

The Dalles T.M.: Jonathan Bourne will be fairly in the swim when the legislature convenes next week. Not satisfied with establishing himself in one of the finest residences in the state capital, he has rented ten rooms in the Elbridge block where he will open headquarters during the session. But Jonathan is just enough of a politician to keep his own council, and nobody knows what methods will be pursued in those elegant quarters."
