If the legislature is organized promptly on next Monday, the first day of the session, the balloting for U. S. senator will begin one week from next Tuesday. A failure to organize on the first day would, under the law, postpone the first ballot for senator one week.

There is a proposition to increase the salary of members to congress to \$7,500 for members, and \$10,000 for speaker of the house. The plea is that a salary of \$5,000 is not sufficient to enable them to take their families to Washington to live. The next move will be, after they have served a half dozen terms, to give them a pension and a fine mansion in Washington as a permanent residence.

The International Typographical Union lost a staunch friend when "Joe" McCullough died. It was McCullough who instituted the "grasshopper cases" away back in the old days of hand composition. The "grasshopper cases" were put up for the benefit of the tourist printers. At any hour of the day or night the union printer out of work could go to the Globe-Democrat office and work on those cases until he had earned \$1. The copy was always ready and "strings" were "caashed" on presentation.

The Portland Dispatch, edited by that most radical democrat, A. Noltner, has this in its last issue: "The malice of the Oregonian towards Secretary Kincaid is based on the simple fact that he has an opinion of his own and the courage to maintain it. He has refused to be a tool to the dictator, and being a conscientious advocate of bimetalism, has refused to surrender to the demands of the party bosses. He is a life-long republican and has always stood with his party until this money question came up. The Oregonian has no use for any one who entertains opinions adverse to its own. We venture the assertion that Mr. Kincaid's two years of service will show that he has made an honest and faithful officer. That is what the taxpayers want. The Oregonian wants an official whom it can handle at pleasure. Those who know Secretary Kincaid will never question his honesty of purpose. It is his normal condition."

It is a pleasure, says the Corvallis Times, to learn that there is at least one spot on earth where there is unbridled prosperity. Zephin Job arrived yesterday from Butte, Montana, where for several months he has been engaged in making "Present Owner" books and doing other work for Montana counties. And it is Butte, Montana, according to Zeph, that knows no such thing as hard times. Two or three million dollars is the amount paid out every month on labor payrolls in the mines in the immediate vicinity of Butte. Ten thousand men are at work day and night under the ground, nearly the whole force engaged in copper mining, and if Mr. Bryan had been elected Mr. Job says, the force that would have been put to work in that vicinity would have passed the one hundred thousand mark. The miners work but eight hours per day, and their pay is \$3.50,

while the work of common laborers is \$3.00 per day, and everybody has employment, that is everybody who belongs to the union. The mines are almost exclusively copper, and the beauty of the arrangements are, that a man with a wagon load, or the man with a train load of ore, can, as soon as the product is delivered at the works, get spot cash for what he chooses to sell. Butte is a city of 30,000, and in probably the most thriving city of its size in the wide, wide world.

Legislative Pointers.

We find the following notes in yesterday's Salem Journal: Dr Driver returned to Eugene yesterday. He met many old Salem friends and selected a seat in the senate chamber. He will now conserve his physical energies to be able to render his constituents full service during the session.

Senator McClung of Eugene has been investigating the records at the state house, and will be prepared to fight the clerkship extravagance.

It is already the impression in the state house lobby that Hon Jo Simon will be president of the senate.

The reports that come to the state house indicate that John H Mitchell's managers are scared to death and are working like beavers to hold men, who were considered staunch supporters, and moving heaven and earth to get populist and democratic support for Mitchell.

Hon H W Corbett, of Portland, is undoubtedly the leading candidate for United States senator on the gold standard side. Mr Corbett is a gentleman of the highest character. His financial and political standing cannot be questioned.

Members of the legislature are reporting the receipt of letters from the national republican committee, M A Hanna, chairman, to stand in for Mitchell, that he is an out and out gold standard man on international lines.
