Legislative Notes.
Senator McClung has introduced the following bills in the senate:
5. McClung, to define taxable property and amend tax laws.
11. McClung, to amend section 3557, reducing legal interest to 6 per cent, making the limit 8 per cent on contract.
19. McClung, to define qualifications of voters at school election, making property qualification.
22. McClung, fixing salary of district attorneys and deputies in judicial district No. 2.
28. McClung, to abolish private bank.
Lane county's members have the following positions: McClung, chairman of the committee on education and member of the committees on irrigation, revision of laws and ways and means; Driver, chairman committee on penal institutions and member of committees on medicine, etc., insurance and banking and counties.
Hon L. Blyden is the leader of the anti-Mitchell forces at Salem.
Today's Oregonian: The democrats held a caucus today and passed resolutions placing the blame for the legislative fiasco on the republicans. They say they will not help either republican faction to organize the house, but that they will go in if all of the republicans go in.
The Oregonian virtually sustains the house hold up. The Salem Statesman condones it.
Mitchell now claims that 43 members of the legislature have signed the memorial caucus—two more than enough to elect.
Representative Thos Vaughan, of Coloug, made two speeches in the House yesterday. The Salem Journal reports them as follows:
Vaughan, of Lane: I am a farmer. I want to get up on my hind legs to ask for information. I came down here with honest intent to work and am in earnest. I saw men walk when the roll was called. I stayed until midnight last night. I'll stay until morning to night. (Applause.)

THE BANQUET.
At 10:30 in the evening all repaired to the banquet hall in the Risdon building and at once locked horns over the most elaborate spread ever seen in the city. The hall was decorated with long lines of ivy hung from which a bewildering profusion of purple clematis blossoms were drooping. One immense elk head and several pair of wide spreading elk antlers served as a part of the ornamentation, and the eye following the lines of decorations was led to a large and very fine crayon Elk at the back end of the room, and two are lamps lighted the room. The beauty and profusion of the tables were beyond description and in the trimmings of the hall and the furnishing of the banquet, Mr and Mrs Brown of the Hoffman House have made a record for themselves which will go with them for many years.
At eleven o'clock, in accordance with an established custom of the order, the toast "Our Absent Brothers" was given and all stood in token of their remembrance, and the toast was beautifully responded to by L T Harris. The serious business of the banquet occupied the attention of all until nearly 1 o'clock at which time the ceremonies were taken charge of by the Toastmaster, Dr C E Loomis. Mr Loomis is one of the most successful presiding officers we ever witnessed. His remarks in introducing the speakers were witty and of a high order and were loudly applauded.
The toast of "Welcome" was responded to by Hon S M Yoran in a speech so eloquent and full of thought as to command the closest attention. The toast to the order "B P O E," by D Solis Cohen an address which for beauty of thought and manner, and eloquence of diction is seldom surpassed or even equalled.
Prof Reid spoke to "Our Guests," H D Griffin, of Portland, to "The Elks," R W Mitchell of Portland; to "Fraternity," F Page Tustin, to "The Baby Elks" (who in this case was Tom Craig and because of his well known timid and shrinking nature, of course received proper attention.)
S H Friendly very eloquently spoke of "Our Country," all in a manner which eminently pleased the brethren and won many high compliments, and the toast closed with that of "The Ladies" by Hon P H D'Arcy, of Salem. This proved the event of the evening, for by reason of the tender, sympathetic soul of the speaker, he became so enthused with his subject that the minds of both audience and speaker were raised to such a pitch of enthusiastic delight that when it finally wound up in a perfect blaze of

glory (and other things) it was felt that nothing could be added to the "feast of reason and flow of soul" part of the exercises, and as the clocks were then pointing to the hour of two, the most brilliant affair that Eugene has ever seen came to a close with many expressions of regret that the party must come and that the lateness of the hour compelled them to forego the pleasure which was anticipated from the three toasts which were thus unavoidably omitted.
