THE LEGISLATIVE MUDDLE.

Oregon has now covered herself in shame by having two lower houses of the legislature. One or the other is illegal. Which is which?

The newly created speaker was elected on the opinion of Senator Geo. F. Hoar, of Massachusetts, who said:

"I think two-thirds of the number actually qualified make a good constitutional quorum. If only 35 qualify, they may lawfully organize and do business. The same question and principle were settled in the national house and senate in the time of the rebellion."

Hon. Geo. H. Williams, of Portland, ex-U. S. Attorney General and ex-U. S. Senator, and considered one of the best lawyers in the country, holds "That it takes 40 members of the house to constitute a quorum." Which of these two men will you believe. Both are republicans, and of national importance.

Two democrats took part in the organization of the new house, Grata and Misner. Messrs. Bilyeu and Lee were not present. The people of Lane county, we believe, will heartily endorse Mr. Bilyeu in his course.

THE DIFFERENCE.

The Kansas City Star says that Kansas City will soon be the greatest mule market in the world. It already ships thousands annually to all portions of the United States, Central America and Mexico.

Ex-State Senator Matlock, of Umatilla county, has been down to Salem observing the senatorial contest, and expresses the belief that if a senator is elected it will not be Mitchell.

A lady in Salem, writing to an Albany relative, says Senator Mitchell goes about among the legislators in a seedy-looking suit of clothes, shaking hands with everybody and inquiring about the babies.

The legislature is composed of 31 farmers, 2 horticulturalists, 1 stock-raiser, 2 cannery men, 5 editors, 5 manufacturers, 1 banker, 2 capitalists, 3 teachers, 11 merchants, 1 conductor, 1 surveyor, 17 lawyers, 4 doctors, 1 brewer, 2 ministers and 1 elder.

The Spokane Spokesman Review offered a prize of \$50 to the subscriber guessing nearest the vote of the winning president. The vote was 7,106,199. The nearest guess was that of Alice S. Ewing 7,107,207. One man guessed Bryan would have 88,196,580.

A laughable incident occurred at Olympia when the state senate was convened. The lieutenant-governor called on a minister, who was a member of the body, to invoke divine blessing, when Senator Rinehart, of Whatcom, interposed an objection. He thought the senators were past redemption, and that praying for them would do no good.

Senator Rinehart evidently sized the present senators up with the members of the last session and very properly concluded they were past redemption. Despite his protest prayer was offered, and the clerk of the senate was invited to sing "Nearer My God, to Thee," when Rinehart insisted that the Salvation Army be invited within the senate chamber.

With an expense of less than \$5 Alva Adams, elected as a democrat, was inaugurated governor of Colorado a few days ago. He walked to the capitol where the oath of office was administered by a supreme court justice without fuss or feathers. His inaugural address was short and to the point, the governor giving the impression in its delivery that performance was better than promises. In the course of his speech he said: "The East and the West need each other, but the West, especially Colorado, with all its diversified resources, can stand alone with less loss than any other section. Around our state might be circled Jefferson's sea of flame or John Adams' wall of brass, yet we could grow, prosper and be happy; but we want no seclusion; we have a sincere and ardent welcome for all the world."
