EDWARDS DAVIS DEFENDS DANCING.

The Rev Edwards Davis, who it is almost needless to say is quite well-known in Eugene, and in the state, through his lecture tours, must be cultivating his reputation to go a on tour again. The radical and brilliant young Oakland minister is delighting the people with a series of ultra-sensational sermons, besides which former efforts seem to lose some of their force.

Sincere or not, the pulpit orator of Oakland now comes out with another broadside. He justifies cards even to bean poker, and he defends dancing. There is no evil in it, he says. There is no reason why a benediction should not fall upon a medley dance or why an invocation should not precede a promenade. The minister says it is insulting bigotry for any one to say that a Christian cannot take part in amusements without sinning. It all depends whether sin is made out of the game, be it cards, authors, dominoes, checkers or chess.

But more than this, the minister declares that the stage is the sister to the pulpit. In the dissertation on "Can Christians sing, Dance, Play Cards or Attend the Theatre," there occurs the following: "The Son of God came not to destroy law, but to fulfill; came not to overrule governments and disrupt society. He ordered tribute paid to Caesar at Cana—without condemning its festivities, gazed on the dancers moving to music, in the gleam of light, and Christians clinked glasses and mirth and dignity and fraternal love reigned in all hearts supreme. There is no reason why an invocation might not properly precede promenades, and God's benediction fall on the medley dance. There is nothing unclean of itself, but to him that esteemeth anything to be unclean it is unclean." It is insulting bigotry for any man minister or not to say that the Christian cannot dance without sinning—sin may be incident, but it is not intrinsic to the dance. Cardplaying is no worse than 'authors,' dominoes, checkers or chess—unless sin is made out of the game—whist, bean poker or euchre. The society idea of prizes is vulgar and vile, and even now considered wretchedly bad form. The stage of the theatre might be, and sometimes is, the sister-art of the pulpit. Booth and Irving in the lines of Shakespearean tragedies, Joe Jefferson and Willard, Mrs Kendal and Miss Anderson have acted sermons—fanciful factors in social culture."

Possibly the oldest woman in England is Sarah Thompson, who, February 5, will be 105 years of age. Mrs Thompson has smoked a clay pipe for 60 years, and bids fair to enjoy life and tobacco for some years to come.
