purpose of ascertaining if they would
consent to being moved to the Yaki-
ma reservation. The old braves who
had made Tumwater their home so
long, were loth to leave the scenes of
their childhood and the place where
their ancestors had lived long before
the white man invaded their territory
and by a unanimous vote decided not
to accept the proffer of the government
to move them. The matter is left to
the option of the Indians, hence the
colony at Tumwater will not be dis-
turbed. The Indians will be allowed
to remain where they were bred and
born, to pursue the even tenor of their
way, living on salmon and smoking
the pipe of peace, as they have for
many generations.
