Mr William H Lawler, manager of the mining company bearing his name operating at Anidem, Linn county, is in Paris, France, where for several weeks he has been undergoing treatment for his eyes. The latest reports received are that the right eye will have its sight fully restored, but the left eye will probably be bereft of sight. Mr Lawler has been kept in a dark room for several weeks, attended only by his surgeon, trained nurses and Mrs Lawler, but it is expected he will soon be released from confinement. The treatment he underwent was a heroic one, but it was the only means left to preserve his sight, and the fact that the operation has proven partly successful is a source of great satisfaction to his family and friends.

The Salem Journal says Secretary of State Kincaid keeps his head clear and refuses to act as arbitrator and "discriminator" in auditing and allowing all the bills against the state of Oregon. His decision is made so clear and plain in a letter written by him that all persons must concede its correctness. 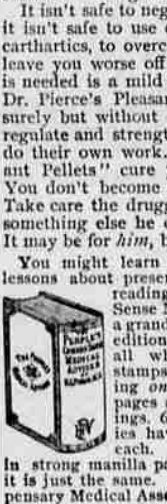
News from hop yards is that but little work has been done towards getting them in shape for cultivation. The continued wet weather keeps the ground in a condition that prevents cultivation.

If nothing more serious than weather shall ever gather about to vex the United States navy the boats will be all right and the country will be in luck.

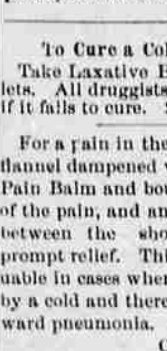
Illinois is a reformer. A bill has been passed in that state providing for a punishment to newspapers for reproducing pictures of prize fighters.
