SENATE REPRESENTATION.

The Oregonian well says: "It is necessary to remind the East once more that, if we have our Nevada and Idaho, she also has her Delaware and Rhode Island. It is past comprehension that the Eastern newspaper can never upon any occasion remember there are small states in the East, and slim populations represented by two votes in the senate. The sheep ranches of Montana cast 20,000 more votes in 1896 than the gaseous state of Delaware. Maryland will have to combine its vote with New York's to equal that of Illinois and Missouri. Oregon has more voters than any one of the seven Eastern states of Delaware, Florida, Mississippi, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, South Carolina and Vermont. All New England did not cast as many votes, by 200,000, as the two Western states of Michigan and Wisconsin."

The East should also remember that the constitutional convention thoroughly considered the matter of senate representation, and in order to protect the smaller states from being overridden and virtually rendered powerless by the votes of the larger commonwealths, New York for instance, made the state itself the basis for representation in the senate, while the population of the state was made the basis for representation in the house of representatives.

That our fathers acted wisely in thus apportioning representation has been often proven. With equal representation in the senate the great states cannot override the smaller, but must accord them equal rights and privileges. The voice of Oregon is as potential in the senate as that of New York or Pennsylvania, while in the house of representatives she is practically a nonentity, so far as having any appreciable controlling influence is concerned.

PROPER ATHLETIC TRAINING.

The Portland Telegram, commenting on the tendency of our modern educational system to carry athletic exercises beyond a legitimate point, says the chief end of college instructions is not in the direction of athletic process. No harm can come from moderate gymnastic or field practice under a professor, but matched games, with their enforced preliminary training are a distraction from the pursuit of scholarship. The moment you have rival clubs in different colleges to contend for mastery you have business and not play, and a business wholly antagonistic to college business. These are the views of every person who labors under the impression that boys are not sent to college to become athletes. If the Stanford-Berkeley games had not been declared "off" by the team managers themselves, it would have been proper for the college authorities to interfere in order that the chief aim of college life might be maintained.

The enrolled copy of the state constitution of Oregon, signed by the members of the constitutional convention, is in the handwriting of Judge W W Page who died the other day at Portland. That instrument was adopted forty years ago, and but few of the members who took part in the work now stand among the living. It was very appropriate that the funeral address over the dead pioneer should have been delivered by Hon L F Grover, ex-member state constitutional convention, ex-congressman, ex-governor and ex-U S senator.

The Oregon City falls of the Willamette give a water power of 56,000 horse power. This is nearly three times greater than that of Lowell, Mass., or Manchester N H. But why mention Oregon City particularly, when Oregon has innumerable water horse power going to waste on every hand? Oregon City's advantage lies in her proximity to deep water, and the ease with which the water can be controlled on account of solid rock bottom and banks.
