MAYOR'S MESSAGE.

Mayor Kuykendall Sends in a Straight
Financial Message to the Council.

Since assuming the duties of mayor,
I have made a careful investigation of
the finances of our city. I did this
first, and mainly because it is my duty
to know just how we stand financially.
I also confess that I was curious to
know by what process a saving of
nearly \$2,000 had been effected during
the past year, as shown by the reports
of retiring officers, especially in view
of the small income and large interest
charge. I have thought a summary of
my investigations might be useful to
you, more especially the newer mem-
bers, so I herewith present the same
in the form of a message:

It seems to me that if we are to man-
age the affairs of the city well, we
must know the exact state of its finan-
ces. Furthermore, it will usually be
found to be good policy in any mat-
ter, to know the full facts, and then
look them squarely in the face. Our
city is not carrying an enormous debt,
yet I think it is somewhat larger than
we have generally supposed. I find
that on the first day of April, 1897, the
total indebtedness of the city was
\$30,137.73, made up of the following
items:

Sewer bonds..... \$15,000 00
Accrued interest on same..... 262 50
Outstanding warrants..... 13,330 73
Accrued interest on same..... 797 65
Bills for current expenses for
which warrants were not
yet drawn..... 746 85

Making a total of..... \$30,137 73
It is possible there may be a few
small bills outstanding that have not
been presented, but the amount can-
not be large, so the above may be re-
garded as a substantially correct state-
ment of the indebtedness of the city at
the beginning of this fiscal year. The
question will very naturally arise,
whether we have any offsets for part
or all of this indebtedness. In answer
I may say, that we have no resources
above those provided to meet current
expenses except some street assess-
ments, which are now and have been
for years, in process of litigation,
amounting to \$2,300.00. If this sum
can be collected it may be applied on
the indebtedness and thus effect a per-
manent reduction. While there now
seems to be a fair probability that
these suits will be decided in our favor,
and that during the coming year, I
think this sum cannot yet be fairly
considered as an offset on our indebted-
ness.

The only other sources of revenue for
the year are as follows:
Taxes, estimated by the re-
corder..... \$7,650 00
Licenses, estimated by the
recorder..... 2,750 00
Fines, estimated by the re-
corder..... 150 00
Cash on hand (treasurer's
report)..... 388 96

Total..... \$10,938 96
Out of this sum the current expenses
of the year must be paid, and no part
of it can be considered an asset avail-
able for payment on the debt, though
possibly, by rigid economy, a few dol-
lars may be applied.

It will be seen that we cannot hope
to secure any considerable reduction of
indebtedness unless the \$2,300 in
litigation should come in during the
year.

While our income from taxes, licen-
ses and fines cannot be considered as
assets to be applied to the permanent
reduction of our debt; still, owing to
our system of paying with warrants,
and collecting taxes early in the year,
a decided temporary reduction of the
debt and a considerable saving of interest
may be effected. As you all know,
we do not pay our current expenses
with the cash received for taxes, but
issue warrants from month to month
as bills are allowed. When funds ac-
cumulate as to justify, a call for war-
rants is made and the older ones are
paid and cancelled. As the greater
part of the taxes are paid early in the
year, the amount of outstanding war-
rants may be reduced several thousand
dollars within the next month or two,
though the constant issue of new war-
rants for expenses will gradually bring
the amount up again, so that it will
be about the same at the end of the
fiscal year.

Before closing I think I may profit-
ably call your attention to a comparison
of our estimated income and our fixed
and estimated expenses. By reference
to a table above it will be seen that
our revenue for the year will probably
be about \$10,938.96. Out of this must
be paid the fixed charges of the city,
such as light and water bills, salaries,

allowances to fire department, etc.,
amounting to \$9,857.00; interest on
sewer bonds, \$1,053.50; interest on out-
standing warrants, (est.) \$800.00; mak-
ing a total of \$8,740.50.

In addition to this there will be cer-
tain contingent expenses that cannot
be estimated very correctly, such as for
wood, supplies for prisoners, printing,
etc. Last year this item amounted to
\$1,734.40. This includes one item of
\$500.00 for new hose for the fire de-
partment. As no new hose will be needed
this year, that item will not need to
appear in next year's account. There
is also included the very small sum of
\$83.65 for lumber, used in street work.
Our lumber bill for this year will cer-
tainly need to be much higher. How-
ever, it is safe to say that these contin-
gent expenses, except the lumber bill,
will not much exceed..... \$1,500 00
To this add the above total..... \$2,240 50

And we have..... \$9,740 50
as the probable expenses for the year
except for work on the streets. The
total estimated income being \$10,938 96
and the expenses..... 9,740 50

We have a balance of..... \$1,148 46
which may be used on street improve-
ments, or applied to the permanent
reduction of indebtedness. The condi-
tion of the streets indicates the cor-
rectness of the estimates of the retiring
street committee, that at least \$1,000
will be required to put them into good
condition. So it seems to me the best
we can hope to do is to keep the streets
in good condition, run the city on a
safe and economical basis, and come
out even at the end of the year. This
may seem a little discouraging for the
year following one in which there was
a reported reduction of \$2,000 in the
indebtedness of the city. But careful
investigation shows that this reduc-
tion was apparent and not real. The
past administration is deserving of
much credit for running the city gov-
ernment with so low a tax, and with-
out any increase in the indebtedness,
but there was no material reduction;
the apparent reduction being due to an
unintentional error in figuring. With-
out going into the details of figures, I
may say that there was no actual re-
duction of the total indebtedness of
about \$250, which I consider a very
creditable showing for these hard
times.

In closing, I recapitulate by saying
that the total indebtedness of the city
April 1, 1897, was..... \$30,137 73
The total estimated income
for this fiscal year..... 10,938 96
The total estimated expenses
for this fiscal year, except
streets..... 9,740 50

Leaving a balance of..... \$1,198 46
available for improvements of streets
and payment on indebtedness.
