GYPSIES AT ROSEBURG
Heading North and May be Expected at Eugene Any Day.

Today's Roseburg Plaindealer: "The gypsy band that has infested the towns south of us as a plague is expected to arrive some time today. They were at Myrtle Creek yesterday. There are eleven wagons, all loaded, and a Roseburger who saw them at Riddle's said a Digger Indian was a prince by comparison. The marshal should inform them that they will confer a favor by moving on and to stand not upon the order of their going but 'git'."

"Since the above was written the outfit has arrived, a little ahead of schedule time, and have pitched their tents in the grove on the banks of the river. The description given above does not belie them in the least. It was soon noised abroad last evening that the gypsies had arrived and crowds of people, mostly young folks and children went down to see them. They were met at the portals of the grove by ragged little urchins impudently tugging them for five cents or ten cents or a ribbon, or a bauble or anything they could get. After the flow of youthful mendicants was passed the women were encountered who desire to tell your fortune and were apparently anxious to do it for any sum from 25 cents to a nickel. They looked as though a bath would do them more good than anything else. Their stay here should be made neither pleasant nor profitable, in order that they may speedily pass on."

The crowd is headed northward and will soon arrive in Eugene.

COUNTY COURT WAR.

The Judge and Clerk of Lincoln County Having a Monkey and Parrot Time.

The row over in Lincoln county between the county court and the county clerk, has reached the acute stage. The county judge is not allowed by the clerk to pass behind the railing in the latter's office, but is required to stand outside like the common herd, and call for whatever papers or documents he may have official use for. The clerk won't sit at all with the commissioners' court as clerk of that body. The commissioners and judge are required to give receipts for the journal of the county court used in keeping a record of the proceedings, and also, to give receipts to the clerk for all papers, including even bills against the county given to the clerk to be by him presented to the court for allowance or rejection.

The clerk, furthermore, acting on the advice of his attorneys, is holding out all the fees collected in his office, having turned over not a cent to the county treasurer since the first of last August. The court, by way of retaliation, declines to issue the clerk warrants in payment of official salary, and so, on and on, with many interesting sidelights, this trouble among the officials proceeds.

This parrot and monkey time is the result of the act of the county court in arbitrarily pruning the salary of the county clerk to \$1,200 per year. Clerk Jones was elected by the people with the understanding that his salary would be \$1,800 per year. Besides performing all the duties incident to the clerkship, he does all the county's recording of deeds, mortgages and other documents. The duties of the office compel the clerk to employ a deputy at \$50 per month and this, with the discount of his warrants, when allowed, together with the other expenses of the office, leave Clerk Jones a salary of about \$28 a month—a meagreness of stipend that very naturally puts the clerk in a very bad humor.

Hops.

Today's Salem Statesman: "Five hop contracts were filed with the county clerk yesterday, the party of the second part in each instance being Herren & Levy. The parties contracting 1897 hops to them, together with their respective amounts and the price per pound, are as follows: Geo W. Ement and Frank Kelzer 6,000 pounds, 8 cents; Henry Taylor and F. E. Goodell, 6,000 pounds, 8 cents; Frank Kelzer, 5,000 pounds, 8 cents; C. C. Wenger, 40 bales, 8 cents; August Miller and J. E. Myres, 100 bales, 7 1/2 cents.

"Kola Nies, the hop man, was in Salem yesterday, going to Portland by the Roseburg train. He stated that the outlook for hops was good, but the indications were that prices would go down to possibly 5 cents per pound before picking time, and that growers generally were anxious to make contracts."

The Item Correct.

Cottage Grove Messenger: "A news item is going the rounds of the press, credited to the Eugene GUARD, stating that Lane county stock men have received this year \$250,000.00 for cattle sold dealers. Now as the average price paid was only about \$15.00 per head this could not be, as there were not enough cattle in the country, had they all been sold, to bring in that amount of money. Guess the newspapers are like the little boy with the numerous squirrels."
The item as originally printed was correct, Brother Messenger. It stated that the Eugene bankers had handled \$250,000 in payment of cattle for buyers. Of course all the money was not for cattle purchased in Lane county. The cattle were purchased in Lane, Douglas, Linn, Benton, Coos, Curry, Lincoln, Benton, Marion and Polk counties, but by far the greater number in Old Lane. This being the center of the cattle business the money was handled by our banks, which are first class.

War Exists in Cuba.

The United States senate by a vote of 41 yeas to 14 nays recognizes the belligerency of the insurgents in Cuba. It passed the Morgan resolution which reads as follows:
"Resolved, etc., That a condition of public war exists between the government of Spain and the government proclaimed and for some time maintained by force of arms by the people of Cuba, and that the United States of America shall maintain a strict neutrality between the contending parties, according to each and all the rights of belligerency in the ports and the territory of the United States."
The affirmative vote was cast by 18 republicans, 10 democrats and 4 populists; the negative vote was cast by 12 republicans and 2 democrats.

A Ripper—Portland Chronicle: "Will Murray our eastside bicycle rider, took a trip to Eugene, Oregon, last week, making the trip of 152 miles by cyclometer, actual road time, in 12 hours and 45 minutes. Will made the trip from Portland to Oregon City and from Aurora to Salem without dismounting arriving at Salem in 4 hours and 15 minutes. The last five miles before reaching Eugene the passenger train overtook him and gave him a lively race—the road was good, on a down grade with the wind in his favor—arriving at Eugene at the same time the train did, making this trip in 11 minutes and 20 seconds. As Will went to a C. E. Convention and is a modern Geo. Washington, we can safely say that the story is true. Murry is going to be without doubt the hardest road rider in the state."
This must have been from Irving to Eugene, and the wagon road in that distance is at least a quarter of a mile longer than the railroad.
