DR CHAPMAN AND THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

Dr Chapman claims there is a local prejudice against him. He is right. We are of the opinion that the regents will hear few friendly expressions in his favor in Eugene. That of itself is sufficient reason for his removal. He has lost the confidence and esteem of the community and his retention will but aggregate the feeling against him that so plainly and unmistakably shows itself on every hand.

But Dr Chapman does not go far enough when, in vain hope to excite sympathy, he plaintively cries out that it is local prejudice. Let the honorable Board of Regents make careful and impartial inquiry and investigation among professors and students, and they will soon learn that Dr Chapman has few friends in the institution.

Not discussing the question as to whether or not Dr Chapman is responsible for this state of affairs we would ask, that, under such circumstances it is advisable, is it for the best interests of the University of Oregon to retain his services? We are well acquainted with the state of public feeling in Eugene, both among students and citizens, and unhesitatingly assert that the retention of Dr Chapman will be a severe blow to the future prosperity and usefulness of the University.

It is to be hoped that the honorable gentlemen who are called upon to decide the matter will make careful impartial inquiry as to the true state of affairs, not allowing prejudice or prior opinions to influence their actions.

We believe we speak the sentiments of the people of Eugene. The university interests are their interests without exception, to it they are loyal, and for its advancement and success they will in the future, as in the past, labor with heart and soul.

THE INDIAN HURT AGAIN.

It is not only the white men who have domestic troubles. Just at present the braves of a couple of Indian tribes down in Oklahoma are having plenty of family afflictions. The powers that be have decided that the Indians shall no longer practice polygamy, and as each of the bucks has from three to five wives, it becomes a serious question as to which wife to keep, and how to get rid of the surplus stock. Civilization has always hit the poor Indian hard blows, but this is the first time it has bothered his domestic affairs.
