JUDGE BELLINGER'S POSITION.

Cannot Honorably Use His Influence for Dr. Chapman.

The Board of Regents of the University of Oregon will meet in Portland on the 29th of this month and at that meeting it will be determined whether or not Dr. Chapman shall retain his connection with the university. Judge Bellinger is a member of that board that must pass on Chapman's case. He is a gentleman whose reputation for legal attainments ranks second to none in the state. He occupies a distinguished position on the bench of the Federal judiciary. From a man of such character we should expect the most discreet and careful conduct in public relations. He should put away all prejudice and do justice to all. Yet we find Judge Bellinger already prejudging the case, if a report in the Oregonian can be relied upon. Will he endeavor to influence his associates on the board when it meets on the 29th instant? We do not see how a gentleman of his character and standing can say one word for Dr. Chapman at that time. If he does his fellow regents cannot but question his motives, and ask each other what manner of a judge it is that disregards all rules of the legal profession to which he belongs.

The regents will act, in a manner, as a jury when selecting a president of the university for the coming year. They know that serious charges have been made against Dr. Chapman which, if proven true, should cause his retirement from the position he now holds. Can they listen to one word from Judge Bellinger on the case? They cannot but remember that while attending the board meeting in Eugene the other day Judge Bellinger, knowing of the charges against Dr. Chapman, became his guest and accepted his hospitality. Is he a competent judge or jurymen to say whether or not Dr. Chapman has done his duty, and should be retained?

His son had a very low standing in university work, considerably lower than several other students who were compelled to quit, yet Dr. Chapman used all his influence to save the young man from the fate awarded the other young men who had a better standing in their studies. He succeeded. Is Judge Bellinger competent jurymen to decide Dr. Chapman's fate?

Judge Bellinger, with these facts known to your fellow regents, can you, will you dare go into a board meeting and urge that Dr. Chapman be retained? Will you have the presumption to speak privately to a fellow regent knowing that he is acquainted with the facts regarding your son and urge, or ask him to support Dr. Chapman? By every rule of the profession which you honor you are disqualified to sit in judgment on Dr. Chapman's case. And what is more, your fellow regents well know the position in which you stand and cannot lay themselves liable to suspicion by listening to your special pleas in behalf of Dr. Chapman. You have made yourself his champion and

the honorable board will regard your representations in the same light as those that emanate from Dr. Chapman; will consider that you are an interested party, and listen to your advice with caution.
