A TOO ZEALOUS ADVOCATE.

John M. Williams, formerly principal of the Eugene public schools, in which position he was succeeded by Prof. Reid, and formerly deputy prosecuting attorney by grace of appointment, was moved by the spirit and could not resist the temptation to get into the Chapman imbroglio, especially as there was an opportunity to give a former successful rival an unkind blow. He made his debut in the Sunday Oregonian.

John M. evidently allowed his zeal to overcome his discretion forgetting that precious maxim about people who reside in glass houses not being exactly in a position to throw stones. As John M. seems to appreciate the personal phases of newspaper controversy the spirit may move us to give him an installment of very interesting reading matter in the near future.

We cannot but remember how he was around, but a few months ago, humble as a whipped puppy, begging that his connection with a very notorious and disgraceful episode at Junction City be suppressed so far as public mention in the GUARD was concerned. That is not all. There are other personal matters, the publication of which would make John M. regret having eased his feelings in public print.

Take warning John M., and hereafter follow the example of other Chapman apologizers and hide your personality under a nom de plume. It is a very convenient way to call attention of the public to the delinquencies and shortcomings of your neighbors without the risk of being called to personal account. It is cowardly, but the coward cares little, or nothing, about principle so long as he can work in the dark and shield himself from personal consequences.

AN IMPARTIAL WITNESS.

The editor of the Junction City Times has a very impartial comment on State University affairs. He takes no side but, alluding to the petition for the removal of Dr. Chapman, incidentally remarks:

"The signers are among Eugene's most prominent business and professional men, men who are not in the habit of attaching their names to every paper that comes along."

The editor of the Times is well acquainted in Eugene, has no personal feeling in this matter, and shows a disposition to deal fairly with all. His impartial statement gives the lie to Dr. Chapman's plea that opposition to him comes from a few prejudiced and interested citizens.

The Board of Regents, if they heed opinions of the state press, will certainly come to the conclusion that the "local prejudice" cry of the eastern importation is without substantial foundation, and made use of only to excite sympathy abroad from people who know nothing of the merits of the case.

WILL DR. CHAPMAN ANSWER?

How can Dr. Chapman remain silent under the grave charges publicly made by one-half the number of the class of '97, and many repu-

table citizens, that he is "UTTERLY UNWORTHY OF BELIEF," that his "retention places a premium on flattery, intrigue, deception and UNTRUTHFULNESS?"

There is a strict libel law in this state. Besides, the gentlemen who signed this most scathing denunciation of Dr. Chapman, his character and methods, are financially able to stand any damage suit.

Is his character and reputation for truthfulness worth anything? One of the petitioners says "specific charges" will be made if required. The Board of Regents owes it to the university, to the state, to publicly investigate these damaging charges. If true, there is no place within the walls of any reputable educational institution for Dr. Chapman.

Chapman and his few friends will soon begin to appreciate the fact that the opposition to him is somewhat broader than "local prejudice." Our state exchanges, almost without exception, speak of Chapman in very uncomplimentary terms. In the face of these adverse comments how can he go before the Board of Regents and claim that it is nothing but "local prejudice?" That though is just what he is claiming.
