A PRECOCIOUS PEOPLE.

Oregon, or rather the territory, now composing Oregon, was rather precocious in her infant days. The old pioneers believed in early marriages and were not slow in legislation concerning them. Carey Martin, of the Secretary of State's office, has been delving among historic records in the state department and gives the following:

"A law of the provisional legislature of Oregon June 22, 1844, made it legal for males over the age of sixteen and females over twelve to marry, the consent of the parents being given."

"An act of the provisional legislature of Oregon of December 12, 1845, authorized the ministers of the gospel, justices of the supreme court, of the circuit court and justices of the peace to perform marriage ceremonies. This was about the earliest legislation on this subject in Oregon."

The people of this day and date would hold up their hands in horror at the idea of uniting boys of 16 and girls of 12 in the holy bonds of matrimony. Yet that often happened, and old settlers have told us that such marriages seldom went amiss. No such things as separations and divorces were heard of in the pioneer days of Oregon.

A TRIPLE ALLIANCE.

A union of the democrats, populists and free silver republicans was formed in Iowa the other day. 1550 delegates were present at the conventions. Among other things the chairman said:

"We concede the natural superiority of some men over others, but we never concede that Rockefeller's brain is 20,000 times bigger or 5000 times more active than other people's brains.
