WHY SIT ON A RED-HOT STOVE?

The Remedy With the People—All Interests Have Suffered From Silver Demonetization.

The gold men have controlled the finances of the country ever since John Sherman struck down silver by cheating congress into the passage of a bill which contained a provision to that end, says the Cincinnati Enquirer. He was able to thus cheat congress by falsely stating that the bill if passed would continue the full and free coinage of "a silver dollar which would float all over the world, and be the equivalent in value of the five franc piece of France." That was more than twenty four years ago. The only relief the people have had from the effects of that piece of legislative dishonesty was when their representatives partially restored silver coinage as a compromise with the emissaries of Wall Street in Washington. Seeing that free coinage was about to be re-established, Wall Street was able to put limitations on the coinage. Accordingly from 1875 to 1892 an average of forty millions of dollars a year was added to the volume of money in this country by the purchase of silver bullion and its use as money. That was the period of which Thomas B Reed spoke in the last campaign as an era of prosperity. Benjamin Harrison declared in his message of December, 1890, that the Sherman purchase act, which provided for the purchase of four million of ounces of silver per month had given "an upward tendency of trade," and had had beneficial effects, as was the intention of its authors. He was one of its authors. An era of prosperity referred to by Mr Reed was stopped short by a coalition between the republican party and the Cleveland Administration in 1893, by the repeal of the Sherman purchase act and the absolute cessation of any further purchase of silver or provision for its coinage. Since that year the country has been in the depths of despair.

The hair of the dog is not good for the bite. The gold quack doctors who have starved the patient purpose to continue the same treatment. Why should there not be a change of treatment? What business man is there who is not the worse for Grover Cleveland having ever lived? Are the banks reaping a rich harvest by the Wall Street policy of contraction? Are the savings banks any the better off for the 50 per cent reduction in the value of property on which they have loaned their depositors' money? Has any stock of goods increased in value above its original cost during the last four years? How long will the business men continue to sit on the red-hot stoves of business depression, because those who are interested in burning them tell them that the stoves are getting cooler all the time, when they know they are getting hotter? Why do not the business men talk these things over among themselves? They need not discuss them with silver coinage men. Let them use the same intelligence

they use in conducting their business, and in all other respects. Let them compare notes with each other and reason out the question. They need never buy large quantities of goods on a falling market, because they know they would sell at a loss. There never can be any other kind of a market so long as the volume of money is being steadily contracted. The volume of money must continue to be steadily contracted until it is reformed by a return of silver coinage. The gold standard is contraction, because the supply of gold from year to year does not equal the increased use for money. Substantially all that is produced goes into the arts, and is not to be had for coinage.

These are plain truths, and if they are carefully read they will lead candid men to but one result, and that is that the gold standard is the enemy of prosperity, and the enemy of all business of a legitimate character. It is as much the enemy of legitimate banking as it is the enemy of all other interests. It serves only financial wreckers who feast and fatten on the misfortunes of individuals, corporations and governments. The remedy is in the hands of the people.
