"BEST" MONEY.

President McKinley attended the manufacturer's banquet at New York Thursday night. The President in his address said all obligations of the government should be paid in the "best" money. That is right. Now what is the "best" money? We contend that any money issued by the government bearing the government stamp is "best" money, paper, silver and gold.

The President and his secretary of treasury ask that gold only shall be paid to the nation's creditors. Silver that is used for payment of debts and obligations of the working classes and masses, that buys their flour, meat and clothing, is not good enough for the bond holders and speculators who thrive off the necessities of the country.

The money loaners and bondholders furnished Mark Hanna the money with which to elect a President, and the beneficiary of the election that was won by a banding together, of capitalistic interests, intends to reimburse his financial supporters so far as in his power lies.

But an unfriendly senate stands between McKinley and further degradation of our silver and paper moneys. That senate says he shall not carry out the program outlined by the Indianapolis banker's convention for retirement of our paper currency by further bond issues. President McKinley is a willing soul and does not hesitate in performing his part of the contract, but he runs up against an obstreperous senate.

In plain words he cannot deliver the goods.

GLASS AND THE DINGLEY BILL.

Last week A. M. Peery, of McMinnville bumped up against the Dingley bill, says the Telephone Register. A window light in his house was broken and he took it to a glazier to have a new one put in. Upon paying for it he found the price of the glass was one dollar. The year before the same sash had been filled for seventy-five cents. Upon Mr. Peery inquiring as to the increased costs he was informed that the Dingley bill was the cause of it. Upon further inquiry he learned that the profit to the dealer was less when sold for a dollar than when sold at seventy-five cents. The man employed in setting the glass received no more for his labor than formerly.

UNION IN COUNTY AND STATE.

The Peoples Press, Peoples party, of Albany Linn county is in favor of union. It says:

"Indications now point strongly to a union state ticket to be named at Portland on March 23. Union on the part of the state ticket ought to be followed by union on county tickets. We therefore, think that both the people's and democratic county conventions should be held in Albany on the same day and a ticket nominated by both conventions that will be fair and equitable."

The McMinnville Telephone Register says the populist, democrat or silver republican who is in favor of supporting the political intrigues of either Penoyer or Mitchell or who stands for a middle of the road separate organization for the coming June campaign, can be put down in the records as a man of poor judgment, or a man probably bought by the Simon-Scott organization to assist in the election of men who will settle finally upon the gold standard herself.

PASSED THE SENATE.

Teller Resolution Adopted by a Vote of 47 to 32.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—After a debate, animated at all times and occasionally acrimonious, which occupied the greater part of the week, the senate this afternoon, by a decisive vote of 47 to 32, passed the Teller concurrent resolution. The resolution is a practical reaffirmation of that of Stanley Matthews, passed in 1878 and is as follows:

"That all the bonds of the United States, issued or authorized to be issued under the said acts of congress hereinbefore recited are payable, principal and interest, at the option of the government of the United States, in silver dollars of the coinage of the United States, containing 123 grains each of standard silver, and that to restore to its coinage such silver coins as a legal tender in payment of said bonds, principal and interest, is not in violation of the public faith nor in derogation of the rights of the public creditors."

The vote was made up of 29 democrats, 5 populists, 4 silver republicans, 7 republicans, 1 independent and 1 silver.

The day vote of 35 republicans and 1 democrat.

Pairs—4 democrats and 1 silver were paired in favor of the resolution with 5 republicans against.

PHILOLOGIAN NOTES.

Roll call at the Philologian literary society last evening showed a good attendance of members present. Those present manifested a more than usual interest and one of the best meetings of the winter was had before President White sounded the gavel and declared the society adjourned until 7:30 next Friday evening.

Mr W Hyde Stalker, class of '98, was called upon for an extemporaneous address and given the subject, "The difference between talk and argument." The sound advice given by a student and active society member of his position could not help but prove of interest to the younger debaters.

The evening's debate upon the question, "Resolved, That the recent victory of Japan over China has been in the interest of civilization," brought out a lengthy discussion on China Japan, war, victory, civilization, with even frequent references to ancient Rome and Greece. The affirmative was led by Mr John Handsaker and L R Alderman, the negative by Messrs V Boardman and Charles V Galvrey. The affirmative argued that the late war had aroused China with its 400,000,000 population from her dormant sleep of ages, and that the beginning of a new civilization in Eastern Asia would work a benefit to the nations of the world. The negative declared civilization had not been brought about by the war, and that indications were pointing to a near conflict between the great powers of the globe over the question of China's partition among them. President White gave a general summary of the points brought out by the respective speakers, and deciding that the negative had answered a goodly share of the affirmative's argument, and produced points not rebutted by them, declared the question in their favor.

The Chinese question will be taken up again next week in the following shape: "Resolved, That the powers are justifiable in their partitionment of China."

RIVER IMPROVEMENT.

Work is progressing in a satisfactory manner.

The reclamation work at Sladden riffle is now about completed. Contractor E F Hutchins has already delivered all the rock necessary for this improvement and also for the work at Da's slough, the same now being piled at the foot of Lawrence street. This rock was taken from the Gillespie butte quarries just across the river north of the city. Next week Mr Hutchins will take his force of men to the Geo Smith quarry, about three and one-half miles down the river and proceed to get out rock for the Scatter bar and dam, and also for other work further down the river.

The work of clearing the channel at Sladden riffle is greatly facilitated by the use of a large scoop shovel, holding a cubic yard, which is placed on the bow of the snag boat and operated by steam. Its work is most satisfactory. Yesterday Major Freeman and Captain Hatch went down the river in a small boat for the purpose of determining the exact location of three or four proposed wing dams and revetments, and to make preliminary arrangements for their construction. This is the first time that systematic work has been made on this section of the river and its thoroughness reflects credit both on Major Freeman, in charge of the work, and on Captain Hatch of the snag boat.
