WAR IS ON THE LATEST

Spain Rejects the Ultimatum Quickly.

Spanish Fleet Leaves Madrid for Conflict.

EXCITING SCENES.

DEMONSTRATIONS AT MADRID

No Formal Declaration of War Is Necessary.

Special Session of Cabinet in Washington.

Engagement Expected Tonight

WASHINGTON, D C, 5:30 p m.—United States Minister Woodford was given his passport at 11:30 o'clock this forenoon, Spain having rejected the ultimatum to leave Cuba.

The United States was notified that diplomatic relations with Spain are severed and that this is a declaration of war.

The President and Cabinet have decided that no formal declaration of war is necessary.

The North Atlantic squadron was ordered to move on Havana from Key West, Florida as a result of the meeting.

All troops are ordered south without delay. They must not stop, save for food and water.

Exciting scenes are to be witnessed in Havana and Key West.

The fleet is now moving on Havana and an engagement is expected tonight.

TROOPS MOVING.

St. Louis gives troops a hearty and enthusiastic reception.

New Orleans is celebrating the arrival of troops. The mayor made a ringing welcome address.

Mobile, Alabama, chamber of commerce and labor organizations enthusiastically receive troops.

Chickamauga resembles scenes of early sixties. American flags are everywhere flying to the breeze.

Chattanooga, Tenn, school children cheer arriving troops and salutes are being fired.

Port Tampa, Florida, is gaily decorated. Stirring speeches and loyalty found on all arriving trains and boats.

New Orleans pledges twenty thousand troops if necessary.

One hundred Americans arrive at Jacksonville, Florida, today from Havana.

WOODFORD COMING HOME

WASHINGTON, D C, 7 p m.—The Spanish fleet has left Madrid with flying colors to meet the American fleet.

The insurgents in Cuba refuse a conference with delegation of Colonial government at Havana.

The Cabinet is holding a special session at Washington discussing war measures.

A national subscription is being raised in Paris, France, in behalf of the Spanish government. It is meeting with ready responses.

Spain says hostilities will begin at once.

Resolutions prohibiting the United States from exporting coal passes both houses.

The Spanish fleet is at 11 at Cape Verde Islands.

A great demonstration is now being held at Madrid.

THE OREGON.

"THE BANQUET"

Has She Suffered the Fate of the Maine?

TREACHEROUS SPANIARDS.

Washington, D C, April 20.—Much apprehension is felt over the battle-ship Oregon, which has been ordered from the Pacific station to join the North Atlantic squadron. The vessel should, about this time, be in the Straits of Magellan. Its course to home waters will take the vessel through the track of the Spanish ships.

The authorities of that nation are thoroughly acquainted, it is now known, with the intended movements of the Oregon and the vessel presents herself as a very attractive target to the enemy.

It is possible that word may be gotten to the Oregon and the vessel taken into Rio and there await convoys from the fleet. It is realized now that the premature announcement of the departure of the Oregon from San Francisco was an unwise action.

A DISTINGUISHED VOLUNTEER

General Lew Wallace Offers His Services to His Country.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 18.—General Lew Wallace, the famous soldier, diplomat and novelist, who was 71 years old April 10, has formally with drawn from the race for the United States senate, and announces that he will enter the army and fight for Cuban independence.

In a statement given out General Wallace says: "In view of the certainty of war with Spain, I have tendered the government my services in the field. That I have been a candidate for United States senator may subject this action on my part to mis-constructon, so I beg to announce my withdrawal from the senatorial race. To the many republicans who have given me their support I offer my hearty thanks and most grateful acknowledgments."

General Wallace does not seem to be speaking unadvisedly. It is known that he recently addressed a letter to the president making tender of his services, and it is believed he received a favorable answer and assurance that he would be appointed to a position commensurate with his talents and with his distinguished services in the war of the Rebellion. As the regular army and National Guard are already officered, it is assumed that he will be a general of volunteers.

Another Chinaman Arrested.—Deputy U S Marshal Geo W Humphrey today arrested Tom Chung, a Eugene Chinaman, charged with having no registration certificate and placed him in jail. He will be given a trial before Judge Bellinger at Portland.
