**A Texas Steer.**

Hoyt's marriest and most popular farce-comedy "A Texas Steer" will appear at The Parker, Tuesday, April 20.

Bray still appears in his original creation "The Minister to Dahomey" and the cast numbers over 20 people, including the Biron City Quartette, Wm F. Walcott, Ben R. Cook, Lester L. Pike, Harry C. West, Frank A. Girard, H. B. Emery, Madeline Winston, Louise Sydmetz, Julia Graves, Gustave Naird and Chas. H. Stevens.

**SECRETARY KINCAID FIRM.**

Convincing Argument Why the Middle-of-the-Road Ticket Should not Be Placed on the Official Ballot.

Republican newspapers and middle-of-the-road men have used every means within their power to induce Secretary of State Kincaid to put the middle-of-the-road ticket on the official ballot. He answers the urgent pleas with fair and convincing arguments as follows:

"If the duties of the secretary of state are exclusively 'ministerial' and he is obliged to file and place upon the ballots all nominations presented, then he has no power to arrange in the manner provided in this act for the arrangements of the names and other information concerning all the candidates contained in the certificates of nomination which have been filed with him, and accepted by the nominee, in accordance with the provisions of this act." If certificates of nomination are presented which are not in accordance with the provisions of this act, he has no authority to put the names upon the ballots, and must necessarily have power to decide what certificates are in accordance with the provisions of this act, in order to perform the duties imposed upon him by law. Whether this power be called 'ministerial,' 'administrative,' or 'judicial,' it exists, or the law has no effect and force and cannot be carried out.

"If a candidate receives several nominations tendered according to law in good faith when he accepts one, the law says, 'it shall be sufficient and shall be equivalent to accepting each one of said nominations to the same office.' His name should then be so placed upon the ballot as representing each party nominating him, as Mr. Spangh's name was placed as presidential elector in 1896. But it does not follow that if socialists or anarchists should offer to file nominations for the purpose of injuring the Republican party or one or more of its candidates, or any other party or one or more of its candidates, as has been suggested, they could force the name of their party upon the ticket.

"That would be a violation of the spirit and evident intent of the law which was enacted to protect electors and candidates in their rights and prevent fraud in printing and arranging the ballots. It the duties of the officer who is charged with arranging, certifying and sending out the ballots be so 'ministerial' that he has no power to decide anything and must file and put upon the ballot everything that is presented, in some instances two parties claiming the same name, in violation of the law, then the law fails and cannot be carried into effect."
