Circuit Court Department No. 1, was convened yesterday afternoon for the purpose of trying the contest case of J. S. Van Winkle against Frank Crabtree for the county clerkship of Linn county, but on account of the absence of ex-County Clerk Montague, who was at Lower Soda, and Deputy Clerk R. B. Montague, who was at the Bay, was adjourned until 1 o'clock this afternoon, when the case was called. Attorneys Hewitt, Cannon, Newport, Somers and Kelley appeared for the plaintiff and Attorneys Weatherford, Blyden, Whitney and Watson for the defendant.  
The safe keeping of the ballots was proven by the former clerk and his deputy, a demurrer to the complaint was denied and a motion for nolle prosequi was overruled, when the counting of the ballots in the order mentioned in the complaint was begun, beginning with Albany precinct and will probably last two or three days.
