FROM MEXICOLAND.

"The Wanderer" Has Another Inter-
esting Letter.

SOME INCIDENTS.

Guadalajara, July 28.

EDITOR GUARD.—Servants in Mexi-
co, as I wrote you before, are many in
every household, for the pay is almost
nothing. The mozo is the man of all
work; does all the dish washing, char-
coal and water carrying, as well as the
dirty work of the household generally.

We have had varied experiences with
mozos since I came to Guadalajara.

We average one a week. The other
servants prove perfectly satisfactory
but the mozo always leaves something
to be desired, perhaps because a great
deal is expected of him. At night he
sleeps on the cold stones inside the
gateway leading to the street, and
must get up and open the gate to any
one that happens to knock. The work
done by him will not be touched by
any of the other servants, so if you
have twenty others you must still have
your mozo. The first mozo that worked
in the house when I came was named
Poncho. He was nearly sixty years
old and stupid. He spent a good share
of his time dumb either in admiration
or horror at my Spanish. He haunted
me and there was no getting work out
of him, so the housekeeper said, and
he scented his discharge, suddenly
had a pain and departed. A servant
never leaves in anger. If they per-
ceive they are not giving satisfaction,
or if they are not contented them-
selves, they have a convenient grand-
mother die and are obliged to have
their wages to bury her, or they are ill

BLUE RIVER MINES.

Mr Dyson Thinks This District is Very
Rich.

WILL PUSH WORK.

Geo A Dyson has returned to his
home in Brownsville after a sojourn
of seven months in Alaska and Grant
and Baker counties. Among other
things he says:

"In all his travels and prospecting
in both the 'Golden North' and
Eastern Oregon he never found as
promising a prospect for paying quartz
mines as he found in the Blue River
country and he is now on his way to
that section where he will go to work
with more faith than ever on the
'Lucky Boy' mine again,—one of the
best prospects for a golden bonanza
that he has seen in this whole north-
west coast, Alaska not excepted.

"The 'Lucky Boy' is bonded
through an Alaska party until the 29th
inst and if they do not take hold then
there are five other parties ready to
take hold at once, but no one can act
now but the present party. Messrs
Standish & Moore started a load of
supplies for the mine today by Gideon
Foust, where Mr Dyson, assisted by
Messrs W O Smith and Israel Moyer
will begin active operations at once.
