A POPULAR BILL.—The Portland Telegram says: Representative Gray's bill requiring towns and cities to submit proposed charters or amendments to the electors of their respective towns or cities before sending them to the state legislature for enactment seems to meet with much favor. The act which has an emergency clause attached, reads as follows: No act or law incorporating any city or town shall be passed by the legislature of the state, unless the same has been submitted for ratification to the legal voters of the town or city to be incorporated or charter amended, and the result of said election, certified to by the proper officer and attached to said charter or amendment before being introduced in either house of the legislature.

DEATH OF JAMES MCKINNEY.—Roseburg Review: At his home in Elk Head, in this county, Monday morning, Oct 10, 1898, James McKinney died of senile pneumonia, and was buried at Cottage Grove the following day. The deceased was in his 72nd year, and leaves a wife and six children. He had been a resident of this county for many years and had numerous friends who will miss him in the daily walk of life.

FROM PORTO RICO

John N. Goltra Writes a Letter From Ponce.

A UNIVERSITY GRADUATE.
Dr John N Goltra, a graduate of the University of Oregon, writes to Mr and Mrs F M Wilkins, in part as follows: C S General Hospital, Ponce, Porto Rico, Sept 21, 1898.

My Dear Brother and Sister: Here I am in good shape, good position, good accommodations, good prospects, good health and good spirits.

I reached here August 25th, and was made assistant to the executive officer and surgeon in charge. Nine other doctors who came with me were assigned to ward duties according to my suggestion. Sept 1st I was made executive officer, no higher pay but much superior accommodations and only consulting. Some removal from the contagion. Yes today we received a telegram announcing arrival of 45 patients in one ambulance train. Forty-five visitors coming in would disturb most any home. But off they went, and left me to take care of them all. In 45 minutes I had every one of them tucked away in some one of the cots in the four large wards. When you have to carry your guests in on litters and take care of them that fast you are ready for business. These men had been hauled 24 miles by the sacred army mule to whom by the way great credit is due for much faithful service, much more credit than is due to some of the heads departments in charge of military arrangements during this war.

These ambulances are two story and carry 4 patients each, with driver and attendant. They are each drawn by 4 mules. When 11 or 12 of them come in at once they make a great sight. Our men were at supper, but I tell you I hustled them out—Drs, orderlies, nurses, convalescents and Porto Rican natives. We carry 25 of the latter on our pay roll this month at 50c per day Porto Rican money equal to about 32 cents our money. I just finished the rolls before I began this letter. We have now 425 patients, about 160 typhoids. No yellow fever or smallpox now though when they came some had both. I am in to this so deep and am so well pleased that I suppose I shall have to stay here a few weeks longer. No political aspirations in this. Lt Woodbridge Geary formerly of Eugene is here, I saw him today, also quite a few Buffaloniens.

I can't tell much yet about the prospects in the business way. Have not had time to look about. Most delightful and fertile spot I ever saw though, not warm, everything green. A shower comes down out of the hills most every day. The hospital is like the old San Gabriel mission in style. I'll try to send you some photos of it. Especially one from my door. I am glad you oppose my coming. I wish I could live here a year or two. Would if my family were here.

MRS GEER DEAD

The Lady Died at Omaha, Nebraska Today.

HAS BEEN IN ILL HEALTH

Salem, Or, Oct 13.—Fred Geer today received telegram from his father, Governor-elect Geer, at Omaha saying, "Worst has come, your mother dead. Bear up; will bring her home." Governor-elect and Mrs Geer were on a pleasure trip attending the Omaha fair. She has not been in good health for several years, but death was unexpected.

Marion County Hops.

The Salem Journal says the hop crop is now moving as fast as shipping facilities are obtained. The crop would be moved from the warehouses much more rapidly were it not for a scarcity of cars. Owing to the heavy shipments East of Pacific coas, products during the past summer, many of the Southern Pacific Company's freight cars are yet east of the mountains or en route westward, and the company is not now able to fill the demand of hop shippers. In consequence, there is a congestion of hop freight at the company's warehouses in Marion county, especially at Salem. The railroad company's three warehouses here are filled to the roof with hops awaiting shipment, and wagon loads are coming in daily. One dealer alone has ordered 15 cars. To move the crop now stored with the Southern Pacific Company, in Marion county, about 5,000 bales, would require a train of about 65 cars.

A NARROW ESCAPE.

The Telegram tells how a man and boy had a narrow escape in the freight train wreck near Portland Wednesday forenoon:

"An old man and a boy about 13 years of age, who were riding the brake beams on the last train, saved their lives by making a daring leap from under the cars a moment before the collision occurred. They were both riding the same beam, and hearing the continual blowing of whistles and putting on of brakes, warned them of the danger, and they concluded to take the desperate chances of jumping out from under a moving train rather than being crushed to death and mangled beyond recognition. By jumping they saved their lives, for the car on which they rode, the third from the engine, was smashed into fragments, all that is left of it being part of the contents and the trucks. The old man broke a thumb in the jump, while the boy escaped without a scratch."
