SEVEN KILLED.

Frightful Accident on Torpedo-Boat.

DEAD. Charles Manely, fireman, married. Paul Luthile, fireman, unmarried. Harry Wood, married. William Wood, fireman boiler shop married.

The bursting of one or more steam tubes in the forward boiler of the torpedo boat Davis while on her official trial trip yesterday fatally sealed seven firemen. The accident occurred at 11:40 a m, while the boat was westward bound, off Tenas Illice, near Cathlamet, Wash. She had run one of the required two hours at full speed, and was making about 23 knots per hour, under a steam pressure of 250 pounds. Until a careful examination of the boiler is made the precise nature of the accident cannot be learned, but enough is known to show that it was one of those mishaps which no man can foresee, and for which no one can be justly blamed.

Large Cattle Sale. Mr W A Lane and family, of Harrisburg, who have been spending some time at Silver Lake, returned home last Friday.

Mr Lane and his brother, Andrew Lane, who died about two years ago, were partners in the stock business, and the trip was made for the purpose of settling up the estate. 1135 head of stock cattle were sold at \$20 each, and 200 head of beef cattle were sold to an Eastern buyer at a good figure. Mr Lane brought 30 head of young heifers across the mountains with which he will stock one of his farms in Linn county.

MELANGE OF DAWSON NEWS

The Whole Country Staked Out--Provisions, Supplies, and Lumber Cheaper--Also Whisky.

PLENTY OF FRESH MEAT.

"There have been a good many rich finds in and about Dawson" says Joseph Clarke, in an interview with a Skagway, Alaskan reporter. "There are several rich claims on French Hill. One old man, about 70 years old, went down 50 feet on French Hill before he got anything, and then he was offered \$8000 for his claim, which he declined. He is now among the few of the wealthy men of the district. One cannot tell where the rich claims are for there has been a good deal of staking, but there is no denying the fact that there are some very rich properties. Everything around Dawson for miles and miles has been staked out, and there are in consequence hundreds of claims that are not worth anything. I believe that a good many strikes will be made however, during the winter by tenderfoot. A good many fellows are in there with outfits and no money. It has been the system with men holding these wild-cat claims to propose to a tenderfoot that the latter, having an outfit, remain on the claim and prospect it, the tenderfoot getting a half interest in the property for his work. It may turn out in this way that a good many of the claims may prove to be gold-bearing to the extent of being rich. It is a very expensive country to mine, and the ground has to be very rich to pay to work it. If any of these wild-cat claims turn out well as a result of this winter's work, it will be the making of Dawson for another season. Outside of this manner of prospecting there will be very little active mining this winter. Labor is again cheap in there, and men are being employed on claims for \$100 per month and board. "If a man owns a building that cost him \$30,000, that will be included in his estimate of his wealth, although that same house can be duplicated next spring for a much less sum. All prices are getting cheaper at Dawson. Food stuffs are cheaper; whisky is cheaper. There is enough whisky and food at Dawson to run that town and the people in there for two years. Healy has reduced the price of whisky per drink from 50 cents to 25 cents. Lumber that this year sold for \$200 per thousand, will sell in the spring for \$35 or \$50, and the houses that will be built will be built of lumber and not logs. There are several mills in there and they will turn out lumber pretty fast. "Turkeys and chickens are cheaper than meat now. There are hundreds and thousands of those fowls in there. There is at Dawson 400 head of hogs, 1000 sheep, and there is distributed between Fort Selkirk, Rink rapids and Dawson 2000 head of cattle. There are at Dawson four undertakers, and they are doing a land-office business. I would not care to estimate the number of saloons, but I never saw so many before, and I never saw so many women saloon-keepers. As soon as the freeze-up sets in there will be about 5000 men come out over the ice, and the most of them will be broke."

DISASTROUS TYPHOON IN JAPAN.

Towns Destroyed and Hundreds of Lives Lost--Shipping Suffers.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 20.—Disastrous typhoons, sandstorms and floods have caused fearful loss of life and property in the Orient. In the district watered by the river Feng, in Japan, hundreds of villages have been swept away and 2000 people drowned. Another report says 250 towns are under water. Thousands of refugees are flocking to the cities. The Ishikari river also overflowed, drowning over 1000 people. In a terrible typhoon off Formosa, hundreds of lives were lost. Among the ships lost was the American bark Comet. The crew was saved. Homebound passengers say they passed numerous abandoned vessels. The loss of life must have been enormous.
