NATIONAL EDITORIAL ASSOCIATION

Will meet in Portland—Oregon Will Be Advertised

The committee appointed by Mayor Mason, of Portland, a few days ago to arrange for entertaining the members of the National Editorial Association, which meets in Portland next summer, is to hold a joint meeting tonight in the Chamber of Commerce rooms.

It is the purpose of these committees, one from the Chamber of Commerce, and the other composed of representative citizens, to inaugurate plans for entertaining the editors in a manner that will eclipse any effort made by any point at which the body has met before.

Here is what a gentleman living in Portland, who has given the subject of advertising considerable thought, thinks about this matter:

"The citizens of Portland might spend \$25,000 and it would not purchase the amount of space in the advertising columns of the papers of the East that this gathering of editors from all over the country will give us. The space we get from them will not be in the advertising columns, either, but in choice position, with reading matter above and below and on either side.

"In addition to this, many articles written about Portland and the coast will be copied all over the East, and there is really no way of estimating the good we can get out of this gathering of scribes, if we only handle them in the proper way.

"While few of them have been to the Pacific coast, nearly all of them have been about, and know good treatment. Some of them go to the meeting of the National Association every year, and are accustomed to being entertained on a grand scale; therefore, the only thing for Portland to do is to entertain them in a way that they haven't been accustomed to heretofore.

"We have a country and a climate out here that will be a revelation to many of them, and we have a city that can put on a good bit of airs when she is so minded, and there has been such an opportunity offered her in this way before in many years.

"There are hundreds of eyes in the East that eagerly read everything they see about the West, and within the next few years thousands of people are coming out this way, and it is to be hoped that the committees having this matter in charge will arrange for the reception of the editors on a scale which will be worthy of the occasion."

STILL UNSOLVED.—A Harrisburg correspondent writes: "There are several parties in the mountains who are still prosecuting the search for Mr Bucknum. As yet there is no clue to his whereabouts. It is an unusual case in that no track or other sign of his presence has been found after a critical examination of the region where he was last seen. Many theories in regard to the course he was likely to take have been indulged in and discussed, but none of them have proved of any avail, and it is generally admitted now that unless the body is found the mystery of his disappearance will never be unfolded."

ABOUT HOPS.—Ed C Herren, of the firm of Herren & Levy, gives some important general average figures on the hop situation. He says that there are left in Oregon 3500 bales of hops of all grades, ranking from poor to strictly prime, which are still in the hands of growers. In Washington there are 9300 bales, 3000 in Yakima and 6300 on Puget sound. Washington growers are holding for 15 to 17 cents, Oregon growers 15 to 18 cents. In Oregon, buyers and growers are within a half-cent of each other, and in Washington there is a difference of one cent.

RARE OLD RELICS.—Mrs C J Howard of this city, has received from her grandmother, Mrs F S Ballard of Coldwater, Mich, a number of interesting relics of revolutionary times. Chief among these are five gold buttons, engraved and lettered, that were worn on a coat by Mrs Ballard's great-grandfather, at the second inauguration ceremonies of George Washington as president of the United States.
