### DAWSON CITY NEWS

Law Powers of McKenzie Bridge Writes the Register Mining and Other News.

### WAGES ARE LOW.

Dawson City, N. W. T., Nov. 17, 1898. Winter is at hand, with the thermometer registering 45 degrees below zero. The rivers are all frozen over, so one can go any place on the ice. There is one constant string of horses, dog teams and men with hand sleds passing the cabin from early morning until far in the night going to Bonanza, Eldorado, Dominion and other creeks where mining is being done. There is more work being done this winter than ever before, and the output will be much greater than it was this spring. Quite a number of the claims on Bonanza and Eldorado will be worked out this winter, which will make less work for next winter, unless more discoveries are made. There has not been as many "strikes" here this summer as was expected, owing to the inequality practiced by the officers here. They would refuse to let a man record a certain claim and then send one of their "pets" up there to stake the same property, which, of course, he would record. Under such a ruling as this, many were discouraged and left the country.

It is reported here that 4,000 people will go out over the ice this winter. Wages are reduced to one dollar per hour and there are more men than work at that low price. Provisions are cheaper than ever before, there being only a few things that are high. There is any amount of provisions here. My brother and I are interested in a claim on the head of Eldorado which, from present prospects, will pay us well. Then back to good old Oregon! once more.
