HAVE A RISING AND SETTING SUN.

This is the chart which the United States offers in its race with the sun. Starting with the eastern limits of Porto Rico in longitude 65 degrees 30 minutes west, with the time fixed at 5 a. m., the territorial limits, longitude and time of day follow this schedule:

New York, longitude 76 degrees west, time 4:15 a. m.
Chicago, longitude 88 degrees west, time 3:15 a. m.
San Francisco, longitude 122 degrees west, time 1:15 a. m.
Honolulu, longitude 155 degrees west, time 10:41 p. m.
Dawson City, longitude 165 degrees west, time 10:21 p. m.
Caroline, longitude 155 degrees east, time 7:42 p. m.
Ladrones, longitude 145 degrees east, time 7:02 p. m.

Manila, longitude 122 degrees 58 minutes east, time 4:42 p. m.
So when it is a quarter after four in the morning in New York, and early birds are getting up, the evening shadows at Manila fall far to the east, at four o'clock and forty-two minutes in the afternoon.

From a speech of Senator Mason of Illinois on expansion: "Distinguished gentlemen who claim a monopoly on patriotism, who don't seem to observe the difference between expansion and explosion, say that we, who believe in getting the consent of the governed before we govern them, want to give back the Philippines to Spain. Every one who makes the statement knows that we want nothing of the sort. Mexico was invaded by the French and we said to them 'Go, it is covered by the Monroe doctrine.' France withdrew her troops and the brave, struggling republic is climbing up the scale of civilization slowly but surely. That is the imperialism that Monroe taught us."

The Roseburg Plaindealer says there is, evidently, a very unfair apportionment of work in the judicial district of the state. The first judicial district, comprising four counties—Jackson, Josephine, Lake and Klamath, is allowed two judges, while the second district comprising the five counties, Benton, Lane, Coos, Curry and Douglas, has but one judge, though the amount of business is nearly, if not quite,

twice as great in the second district as it is in the first. Judge Hamilton would be the last one to object to the amount of work he has to do, but he is certainly doing more than his share. A bill should be introduced relieving the state on a more equitable basis.

There will be no need of an extra session of the fifty-sixth congress if the present congress will only pass a bill to give Secretary Alger all the soldiers he will need, says the McMinnville Telephone-Register. The Dingley bill is in force, the war revenue bill will continue, and Secretary Gage has authority from congress to sell three hundred million more bonds. If the people will furnish the money and the soldiers Secretary Alger can divide up Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines among his friends without any further assistance from congress.

We are far away from Lincoln's day, and the news that a personal friend of the martyr president is on the verge of death comes as a sort of surprise. 1865 and 1899 are a long way apart when estimated by man's life.

A Boston man has paid \$30,000 for a newly originated carnation flower on condition that it be grown only in Boston public gardens. Probably a sharp advertising scheme by which some florist hopes to profit.

An Explanation to Comrades.

EDITOR GUARD: In looking over the list showing what it cost to run Lane county one year, published in the DAILY GUARD of January 18, I find expended for indigent soldiers \$157.05, which is all O. K. But in order to make it understood clearly by the comrades will say: When I made out my report and read it to the Post in December last, I had all the bills for the relief of indigent soldiers in my possession. When footed up the figures showed the money drawn by me from the county, as per application to the court for aforesaid purpose to be \$95.00, not including the old soldier at Fairmount which did not come under the jurisdiction of the G A R Post, the court looking after him outside said Post. Then Cottage Grove Post, also others not under my jurisdiction had to be assisted by the court, thereby swelling the amount to \$157.05. Even that is a very small amount considering the number of old soldiers, and widows in Lane county. J W Geary Post alone has close to 130 members in good standing, having nearly doubled in number since January 1st, 1888.
