COUNCIL MEETING

Tax Levy Will Be Made at Adjourned Meeting Tonight.

THE CURFEW ORDINANCE.

The Eugene city council will meet in adjourned session tonight, Mayor Kuykendall having arrived on the afternoon local.

The principal object of tonight's session is to make the tax levy. The work entailed in making a careful estimate of the municipal expenses during the current year, and making a levy that will satisfactorily meet the same, will consume some time. It is not likely any other business will be considered.

Chief of Police Stiles informs a GUARD reporter that the Curfew ordinance will likely be strictly enforced in the near future. This ordinance, while having been a law for a number of years, has practically been a dead letter. One of the principal reasons for this is that the city has owned no bell which could be used for this purpose.

The county court has agreed to loan the city the old court house bell for a time and it will be erected near the fire bell tower, and used to call wandering urchins home.

This is a good resolution. As worthy a law as this one should be enforced.

A CLERK.—From yesterday's house proceedings: "Brattain introduced house resolution No 16, rescinding the action of the house in allowing an additional clerk for the committee on mining. Mr Brattain explained that the extra clerk was not necessary, that such clerk was not asked for by him as chairman, or by a majority of the committee; that no bill had yet come before that committee, and he did not propose to bear the odium of such action. Mr Curtis wanted the resolution referred to the committee on resolutions inasmuch as Mr Virtue was sick, probably he said, on account of that clerk. Mr Flagg moved to postpone action until Mr Virtue should be in his seat. This motion was lost and Mr Curtis' motion prevailed.

DR. KUYKENDALL.

He has taken a lively and intelligent interest in educational matters and has diligently looked after them beside several on some other very important committees.

H R KINCAID.

"I do not endorse the vile and vindictive assault upon H R Kincaid, ex-secretary of state, by 'A. H.' (Alfred Holman, a nephew of Senator McBride.) No doubt Mr Kincaid, like other members of the human family, has his short comings, but dishonesty and theft are not among them. He has retained in office for four years nine members of the McBride family and was severely criticised by his political friends for keeping them as contented 'continually in office.' Those in position to know claim that Mr Kincaid's administration has resulted to the state's profit thousands of dollars above any of his predecessors in recent years. 'Man's ingratitude to man' is beautifully illustrated in this case.

"I have the profoundest respect for those who differ with me politically, religiously or otherwise, but I have the utmost contempt for the ungrate. I have stated heretofore that that gratitude is a word of three syllables, found in the dictionary and no where else. This certainly has been verified in Mr Kincaid's place."

SARAH'S M'CLURE.

The pioneer woman whose name heads this notice died at the home of her son-in-law, Palmer Ayres, across the river from Eugene, Friday January 20, 1899, aged 79 years 4 months and 24 days.

Mrs McClure was born in Kentucky August 27, 1819 and with her parents moved to Missouri in the early settlement of that state. In 1859 the pioneer fever caused her people to move westward, and winter of 1859-1 was spent by them in Salt Lake City. In 1851 they resumed the journey and with her first husband, Benson, settled on the claim two miles north of Eugene where she died. After the death of her first husband she married Vincent McClure who preceded her to that other shore in May 1892. Six children were born to her but two of whom are living. She leaves two sisters, Mrs J C Bushnell and Mrs Francis Harlow, and two brothers W S and R R Tandy.

The interment will take place from the residence of Palmer Ayres, two and one-half miles north of Eugene, to the Gillespie cemetery Sunday forenoon, January 22, at 11 o'clock.

A single blast in the Bonanza mine in Baker county last week at a depth of 500 feet, through eight holes made with Burleigh drills, brought down about 30 tons of ore and waste. Twenty tons of this ore contained \$63,000 worth of gold, almost all of which was free gold. The ledge in this place is three feet wide, and the value of the ore knocked down in a single shot is the biggest ever recorded in Oregon.
