THE LEGISLATURE

Only a Few Days More of the Present Session.

SEVERAL JOBS.

SALEM, Feb. 13.—Very little work can be done by our lawmakers during the remainder of the session since, today neither house convened until 2:30. Tomorrow both houses will be celebrating "Admission Day," while on Friday it is presumed an adjournment sine die will be the order of the day.

Harvey Scott, chief mogul of the Oregonian, was a Salem visitor Friday, laboring for the defeat of the bill creating the office of tax collector in Multnomah county.

The sugar beet bounty bill will come up in the senate today or Wednesday in a new form, but unless greatly changed cannot pass that body.

IMPROVING MOHAWK RIVER

Lane County Stream to Be Made Navigable for Logs.

Today's Oregonian: "John Kelly, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, of Saginaw, Lane county, is registered at the Imperial. His company has recently obtained a charter from Lane county, authorizing it to improve the Mohawk river for a distance of 23 miles, so as to render it navigable to log drives to its junction with the McKenzie, where a large sawmill is to be erected.

"The contract for blasting out stumps and drifts and building dams on the Mohawk has just been let to a company of loggers, Mr. Kelly says, and the work will begin immediately. A fine body of fir along the Mohawk and its tributaries will be opened by the promoters of this new enterprise, and steady work will be given to from 90 to 120 hands in mill and logging camps.

The two mills already operated by Booth & Kelly, in Lane county, cut in the aggregate some 80,000 feet of lumber per day. This is flumed from the mills, five miles east, to Saginaw, where it is loaded on cars of the Southern Pacific and shipped to California, Arizona, New Mexico and other localities further east.

The Storm at Blue River.

Blue River, Or. Feb. 11.—Nine days ago a heavy snow storm began here, and the snow fell over a foot, just as the last snow was going off. The mercury hovered about zero for many days, (ill yesterday, when it rose, but so far this has been the worst winter for years in this section.

Work on the wagon road to the Lucky Boy mine had just been started when this last storm came. The wagon road is finished to a point within about a mile and a half of the mine, but some heavy rock work is now to be done.

The summit of Gold hill and the mountains all around are covered with deep snow.

BOHEMIA DISTRICT

Western Oregon's Great Mining Center Still Booming.

NEW COMPANY ORGANIZES.

A recent letter from Bohemia reports a late strike of some importance in the Fairview company's property on Fairview mountain. They put up a five stamp mill last fall and made a month's trial run by stripping the ledge on the surface, which gave \$10.00 per ton free gold. The mill was shut down for the winter, for want of wood. They are developing the property this winter. Have cut the ledge 150 feet deep and drifted on some short distance, where they have struck a large body of free-milling ore. No assays have been made yet, but numerous pan tests have proven the same to be very rich ore, and they have not found the extent of it yet. As soon as the snow will permit wood cutting in the spring, this mine will take its rank among the dividend payers. One year ago this property was only a raw prospect, practically of no value.

The Hyannthy group near the above, has been bonded to eastern parties who are driving 100 feet of tunnel this winter to determine the extent of the rich ore shown on the surface, and if satisfactory, will equip with machinery and necessary development to put it on a paying basis.

Fairview mountain is conceded to contain the freest milling ore of the district, and the many properties being developed on and around same are destined to gain considerable prominence.

If the railroad from Cottage Grove to Bohemia, which so far is a wind and paper road, ever materializes to a full fledged road, headed by an iron horse, it will be hard to compute the future possibilities of the Bohemia district, or the benefits to be derived therefrom to Lane county.

There are a great many properties throughout the camp, which with shipping facilities, even with limited capital, could be put on a paying basis and made to develop themselves. There are thousands of tons of base ore that is rich enough to ship direct to a smelter, at a large profit. There are many properties that are part base and part free-milling, where, by having shipping facilities for their concentrates, with the free gold caught by amalgamation, would make them paying investments.

It can be said of Bohemia, which is hard to say of any other camp, that among the hundreds of shafts and tunnels run on ledges in all parts of the camp, not one has been abandoned and pronounced valueless. All show pay ore that could be worked at a profit by having the proper mining and milling facilities, which many failed to provide for when locating their claims.
