A JOURNALISTIC PETTIFOGGER

The worst shyster lawyer in the country cannot equal the Oregonian in its pettifoggery on the financial question. This paper asked the Portland autocrat to explain "how \$785,000,000 of gold circulation in the United States carries \$2,461,000,000 of all kinds of money in the country and makes it good" whereupon the Oregonian retorts that there is no more than \$1,928,828,000 in circulation.

The editor would break the force of what is the strongest argument against the single gold standard—that a metal wholly insufficient in volume and quantity to meet the demands of trade and business should be selected as the one factor to carry the world's financial load. The Oregonian would take no note of hundreds of millions of gold piled up in the United States treasury, and would not count that as belonging to our circulation. It would treat that gold as naught in order to make a better showing for its pet gold standard theory. As well ignore the millions of dollars of gold piled up in bank and private vaults throughout the country.

Money circulation means something more than the actual spending of it for bread and butter. Its very existence implies circulation, for without that circulation, whether of one particular piece of money or another, the whole would soon become valueless.
