TRUST ORGANIZATIONS.

Immense Stock Issues—Proposed to Prevent Competition.

From advance sheets of the Commercial Year Book, shortly to be issued from the New York Bulletin's office, we are able to present a summary of approximately complete statistics of the trust organizations in the United States. We here use the term "trust" in its broadest popular sense; as covering not only consolidated corporations, framed for directly monopolistic purposes, but also alliances of independent organizations acting under a common understanding for the purpose of less directly regulating or defeating natural competition, the latter being but a small proportion of the whole. At the end of February these combinations numbered 353, with the following aggregations of capital stock and bonded debt, compared with a year previous:

The detail included in these totals have, in some cases, been difficult of procurement, and in some instances estimates have had to be adopted; we therefore cannot in all cases claim precise accuracy; but from the care that has been exercised in the compilation, we feel justified in claiming a close approximation to exactness in the totals above set forth.

It will be seen that, at the end of February, these 353 combinations had issued a total of \$5,118,500,000 of capital stock and \$714,388,000 of bond obligations. One cannot appreciate this immense capitalization until taking thought that the entire gold stock of the world is but \$4,292,300,000, just about the amount of common stock issued by the trusts during the past year.

A HORSE EDITOR REPORT.

CAPTAIN GEARY IN PORTLAND.

Direct From Porto Rico—Ordered to Manila.

Portland Telegram, April 12.
Captain Woodbridge Geary arrived in Portland last night direct from Porto Rico, having left that island on March 21. He has been ordered to Manila with the Thirteenth Infantry, and will join his command at San Francisco in about three weeks, when it will embark for the Philippines. In the meantime Captain Geary will visit his family at Corvallis. He was military instructor at the Oregon agricultural college at Corvallis, where he was on detached duty until May of last year, being given active service when the war broke out.

Captain Geary is an Oregonian, and was appointed to the military academy from Oregon by Congressman Richard Williams. He graduated in 1882. He was appointed to a captaincy on June 30, 1898. He is a brother of E P Geary of Portland. Captain Geary served throughout the Porto Rico campaign with the Nineteenth Infantry.

New Fish Commissioner.

Salem Journal April 12: The appointment of Hon F C Reed, of Astoria, as fish commissioner to succeed Hollister D McGuire, was this afternoon announced by Gov T T Geer. Mr Reed is a prominent citizen of Clatsop county, and has served in the Oregon legislature. He has had wide experience in the fisheries work on the Columbia and his appointment will no doubt prove very acceptable. He is the right man for the place.

Lane County Cattle.

Telegram April 12: The Union Meat Company, of Portland, has been buying cattle in Lane county, and in a lot purchased of Williams Bros, Junction City, the average weight of ten steers and ten cows was 1281, making a total weight of 25,625 pounds. The average price paid was 31 cents per pound.
