ARE HANGING FOR MURDER.

Hereafter no one can assert that there is no hanging for murder in Lane county. It took a long time to make the start, a number of desirable gallowes birds escaped just punishment, but one example has been made. Whether or not capital punishment is deterrent of crime is a mooted question, but in a case like this there is one satisfaction—the law has been justly enforced. There was no mistake as to the verdict of the jury, or the righteous sentence of the judge.

THE BRANTON WRITE-UP.

The write-up of the Claude Branton execution in the GUARD is the work of Howard W. Rowland of the GUARD editorial force. Viewed from the standpoint of a professional newspaper man it is a finished and excellent piece of work, the descriptive and analytical parts being well blended into a harmonious whole.

Mr Rowland's work will not suffer in comparison with that of the most carefully trained writers on metropolitan journals. It is a complete history of a well planned crime, together with the account of the fatal drop that ended the life of the young man who displayed such remarkable nerve from the inception of the horrible crime till the last act when Sheriff Withers sprung the trap.

The Eastern peach crop will be very light. Late advices also indicate that the injury has extended, in a less degree, to all stone fruits, and especially to Japanese plums, of which the harder varieties have been freely planted in many localities. Some injury is reported to apples and pears, but so far there is no reason to fear any particular shortage in these crops. The raspberry and blackberry canes are reported killed in many sections. It ought to be a good season for Eastern shipments of fresh fruit from this coast.

Trusts in the industries have been regarded with aversion if not alarm. But the passion of humanity, love of gain, may be the solution of the problem. It was announced a few days ago that an opposition steel fence wire trust is forming with a capital of many

millions. The men in the original combination are not the only selfish ones anxious for gain. Thus men will be pitted against men, and this diversity of interests may regulate what otherwise might become an intolerable evil.

Lord Oldenham, one of the governors of the bank of England, favors free-coinage of silver at a ratio of 22 to 1 and is using his influence to bring about an international agreement to this effect, but to his surprise he received little encouragement from President McKinley, although he was elected on a platform which pledged his party to international bimetalism.

A mammoth window glass combine, capitalized at \$30,000,000 it is said, is about to be completed. The new trust will control absolutely more than ninety per cent of the country's window glass production. If a window glass trust cannot be broken there is little hope for the deliverance of this country from the oppression of combined capital.

The wisdom of a private execution law was fully demonstrated yesterday. Had the Branton hanging been public a very large concourse would have witnessed it. And no small number of women and children would have viewed the spectacle. The general interest taken justifies this statement.

Philadelphia papers haven't had much to say about the failure of the South Carolina jury to agree upon a verdict in the case of the alleged lynchers. Since Quay's acquittal Philadelphians are not criticizing the acts of juries in other localities.

There certainly is a shortage in the lumber market somewhere, as indicated by the way saw mill men and capitalists are buying up mills and timber lands in Western Oregon this season.
