THOMAS PAINE.

The ease with which men are forgotten after death, or rather neglected, is shown by the completion of a monument to Thomas Paine sixty years after the shaft was placed in position. Fame has dealt unkindly with this great spirit whose writings, more than of any other man, contributed to the establishment of this republic and the permanent foundation on which it rests. A great mind, a sterling patriot! But Paine wrote the "Age of Reason," and other works attacking Christianity with all the force and vigor with which he had attacked monarchial institutions, thereby subjecting himself to bitter criticism, even persecution. Men may be found who are familiar with general literature, but have never read Paine's splendid and unanswerable presentations in behalf of our country's freedom because of earlier prejudices that associate his name with that of the devil.

Had "Tom" Paine been content to rest his fame on the laurels gained by his pen when used in behalf of American independence his name would occupy the topmost niche among our many patriots. Future generations will give him the just meed of praise after his philippics against religion shall have been forgotten.

EYES HELD IN POSITION.

Novelists have described how murderers have been brought to justice through the retina of the eye of the victim receiving and retaining the image of the slayer at the moment of the fatal blow. The Crook County Journal of a recent date relates how the eyes of a murdered man were held as at the moment of the killing. It says:

"The killing of Jones at Antelope by Spicer was remarkably strange in one respect. Jones was armed with a double barreled shot gun and Spicer with a 22 calibre rifle. When Spicer shot, Jones fell forward on his face still clutching his gun which was cocked. On examination of the body of Jones his left eye was found closed and the right eye open as in the case when a person takes aim in shooting. The bullet had severed the sort just above the heart and penetrated the spinal marrow producing paralysis of the entire body and death so instantaneously that not even the muscles of the eyes contracted sufficiently to close the one or open the other. Such conditions would not arise once in a thousand times."

NORTH PACIFIC COAST.

Canada is very anxious to secure a port on the North Pacific from the United States by which she can reach the gold fields of Yukon tributaries through a water and land route. Our Russian purchase includes a narrow strip that follows the coast from latitude 60 degrees north, where the Alaskan peninsula commences, to 55 degrees, effectually controlling ingress to the gold fields through the water route.

While our government may extend commercial privileges to the Canadians in the way of transporting their goods across the narrow strip of territory, it is not probable they will be given any foothold on the coast. That would be a dangerous experiment—too much like China parting with ports on her coast, with the difference that Canada expects to gain her ends through peaceful negotiations, while China was forced to relinquish her rights through the mailed hand of war.

Congress fixed the limit of price for the purchase of armor plate, Carnegie and the Bethlehem works, the only two plants in the country, respond with notice that they cannot furnish the armor at the price fixed by congress. They have the best of the government which will be compelled to come to their terms.
