Mr and Mrs Abrams will arrive in Eugene in a day or two, and visit here about a month, and will then go East to spend the balance of the summer and fall.

PROSPECTIVE PRESIDENT.—Prof F Strong, of New Haven Conn, arrived here this afternoon. We understand that he is a candidate for President of the University of Oregon, and is here to look over the situation. We are also informed that the Regents have narrowed down their choice to two persons—Mr Strong or Mr Gordon, who was here a short time ago from Chicago.

LABORER'S LIENS.—J H O'Dell, J A Leonard and C F Peek have each filed a laborer's lien in the circuit court against R R Deadmond, a logging contractor who has been operating on the McKenzie this season. The amounts of the claims are respectively \$106.50, \$102.75 and \$170. The amount of logs involved is 900,000 feet.

OFFICIAL VISIT.—Eugene Lodge No 11 A F & A M was paid an official visit last evening by Hon John B Cleland, Grand Master. A large attendance was present. During the evening a delightful luncheon was served. Judge Cleland went to Salem on this forenoon's train.

TWELVE CENTS OFFERED.—E C Smith has an order for 400 bales of hops of the coming crop. He will contract for 12 cents per pound and advance five cents for picking and drying. Frank Page has an order for 300 bales at like prices. Growers should never contract.

STUDIES CEASED.—Studies in the Eugene public schools ceased today, excepting in the higher grade. The pupils must appear tomorrow, however, to learn of their promotions or otherwise.
