TRUSTS AND SUBSIDIES.

The shipbuilder's trust has assumed control of the three shipyards in Cleveland Ohio, and one of the octopus' officials informs a reporter that under the new management about five hundred employees will lose their jobs. Of this number between seventy-five and one hundred are bookkeepers, stenographers and clerks. Yet the Hanna-Payne shipbuilding subsidy bill is before congress, asking for a princely appropriation for the fostering of this very trust! And it is likely to go through, too, now that the recreant Reed has sold the speakership.

We suppose the old argument will be revamped for use in excusing this reduction of the working force. It will be said that the cost of production will be so lessened that poor people may have ships of their own. The folks living in Kansas will like this.

If ever an editor has murderous inclinations it is when employees make similar mistakes to the one that crept into the San Francisco Examiner the other day. The editorial writer had it that the "merchant's association opposes the Geary street steal." It was published that the "association approves the Geary street steal." A coroner's jury could not render a verdict of justifiable homicide under such circumstances.
