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### COMMENCEMENT

Graduating Recital of Miss Joyce Priscilla Brownell, Musician.

#### CLASS FIELD MEET TODAY.

The first graduate of the University of Oregon department of music since Mr. W. Gifford Nash took charge, gave her final recital last evening. The young artist is Miss Joyce Priscilla Brownell, of Albany. She possesses the musical temperament to an extraordinary degree, and has been developing into a finished performer on the piano under the instruction of Mr. Nash, with whom she has been studying since March 1894. Miss Brownell played fifteen selections from such composers as Bach, Beethoven, Handel, Chopin, Grieg, Liszt, and others, while her repertoire includes as many more compositions from these and other composers as Schubert, Schumann, Godard, Rabenstein and Weber.

Mr. Nash has demonstrated through this clever pupil that the piano can be the means of expressing music in its best sense rather than a mechanical exhibition. The first two numbers, which were heavily classical, were played with technical sureness and broad musical intelligence.

Entering the romantic school in her third selection, Miss Brownell played Mendelssohn's study, "If I Were a Bird," and Grieg's "Batterfly," with charming delicacy. The "Romanes," by Channide brought out a singing quality of tone, while the "Tosca" by Moszkowski showed the brilliancy of her technique, a feature that was no inconsiderable part of the program. In the four numbers from Chopin Miss Brownell revealed a depth of feeling and eminent poetical interpretative faculty such as to inspire her audience.

The recital closed with three numbers from Liszt. In the last, Rachinsky No. 6, the bravura of Miss Brownell's active playing created great enthusiasm.

Miss Ada D. Hendricks, the popular reader, assisted Miss Brownell. Her number was "A Sisterly Scheme," cleverly and naturally told. It produced an admirable effect upon the audience and Miss Hendricks graciously responded to repeated demands for an encore.

Oregon owes much to Mr. Nash for the earnest work he has done for music. Himself a finished performer, having enjoyed years of study in America and Germany, Mr. Nash keenly feels the nobleness and exalted dignity of the divine art, and the state can feel assured that a pupil receiving distinguished honors from him is entitled to all that such an education implies.

### CITY COUNCIL

A Large Amount of Routine Business Was Transacted.

#### DOG ORDINANCE PASSED.

City council met June 13th in regular session.

Present—Full board, except Councilman Haines.

Finance committee reported favorably on a number of bills and they were allowed and ordered paid.

Councilman Abrams, from judiciary committee, asked further time to report on claims for errors in 8th and Blair streets assessments. Granted.

Councilman Luckey read monthly report of street committee. Ordered placed on file. New lumber used 3,583 feet; old 400. Personal labor, 5 days.

The improvement of Talley's alley, laid on table.

Improvement of First street laid on table.

J. E. Jennings' request that Rescue home team be allowed the use of the racing cart, their own cart being too heavy, was laid on table.

The mayor mentioned the condition of the waste water at the livery stables. The marshal was directed to give the matter attention at once and abate the nuisance if found to be a nuisance.

Councilman Roney reported on petition of M. O. Wilkins for removal of nuisance. He moved to lay the petition on table; carried.

The following communication was read:

EUGENE, Or, June 10, 1899.

To the Mayor and Common Council of the city of Eugene:

In view of the fact that the present condition of the streets and buildings surrounding the public square prevent the proper enjoyment thereof, and in fact a nuisance to said property, we respectfully ask you to commence such proceedings as are necessary to abate such nuisance.

Referred to the judiciary committee and city attorney.

Remonstrance against the proposed sewer in alley between Pearl and High streets from 12th street to the main sewer read and referred to the committee on fire and water. The petition represent 3,360 feet of the same.

Mr. Denmore appeared and on behalf of himself and his neighbors, asked for an order right at 13th and Oak streets. Referred to committee on fire and water.

Dog ordinance taken up. Sections 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 adopted. Ordinance amended read and passed.

[The ordinance provides that no person shall harbor a dog in the city without having first procured a license for it at the rate of \$1 per year for each male dog and \$2.50 for each female dog. If the same be violated said person is liable for a fine of not less than \$2.50 nor more than \$10. However, the council struck out the imprisonment clause if a person refused to pay the fine assessed. And to us this looks like child's play in passing such a "dead" ordinance. Better repeal it at the next meeting of the council. Without an imprisonment clause the ordinance is totally worthless.]

Ordinance declaring intention to construct a sewer in alley between Olive and Charnelton streets from 8th to 11th street read third time and passed.

On motion of Councilman Abrams a 10 candle power electric lamp was ordered placed in stair way at City Hall.

Councilman Luckey moved the street committee be directed to examine and report for removal all trees obstructing sidewalks. Carried.

Councilman Abrams moved that Fourth of July committee be granted permission to grant privileges for stands, merry-go-rounds, etc on July 4th. Carried.

A number of bills were referred to the finance committee.

Adjourned to meet Friday night June 16 at 8 o'clock.

Circuit Court Suite.

J. C. Goodale vs J. N. B. Fuller et al; to set aside deed. Complaint asks a certain deed from J. N. B. Fuller to his wife Mamie C. Fuller, to be set aside. The amount due is alleged to be \$491.18.

J. C. Goodale vs A. Wheeler et al; to set aside. It is alleged in complaint that A. Wheeler deeded certain property to relatives to defraud plaintiff. The amount due is alleged to be \$925.

Cawston & Co vs J. C. Goodale; to recover money. Judgment is asked for \$750.

Alfred Ladd vs Roxina Ladd; suit for divorce. The couple were married in Eugene, Dec 19, 1888. The complaint alleges cruel and inhuman treatment.

### CONVENTION

Christian Church of Lane County Met at Junction.

#### SYNOPSIS OF MEETING.

The sixth district of the Oregon Christian Missionary convention, comprising Lane county, met in convention at Junction City last Thursday, 45 delegates being present. Among those from Eugene were Rev. and Mrs. M. L. Rose, Dean Sanderson, E. Beaudreau, E. M. Patterson, H. Benton, C. R. Moore, John Handsaker, Mrs. Clara Esson and Mrs. L. Green.

Officers for the ensuing year are M. L. Rose, president; E. Beaudreau, secretary; J. A. Bushnell, treasurer.

The convention suggested that the church at Clear Lake be moved to Irving, and appointed a committee to confer with the church and set for the convention. The offer of Rev. Powell of Oklahoma to do evangelistic work in the county was accepted and Rev. Powell recommended to the churches.

The committee on future work especially urged the employment of Messrs. Beaudreau and Patterson as county evangelists for the summer.

Resolutions were passed thanking the retiring secretary, Rev. Eugene Finn, for his untiring service for the past eight years and recommended him to the brotherhood wherever he may go. A letter of sympathy was also ordered sent to the family of the late Rev. R. Doty, expressing the hearty appreciation felt by the convention for Rev. Doty's excellent work.

The Friday afternoon and evening session was in charge of the auxiliaries of the Christian Woman's Board of Missions. Mrs. M. L. Rose presided. Three auxiliaries were represented. Mrs. D. C. Kelams, Mrs. D. Read and others took prominent part on the programme.

In the evening Mrs. L. Green of the Divinity School delivered an able address on "America's Evangelization and the part women shall take in it." The convention unanimously asked that the paper be published.

Saturday morning the Sunday school convention opened. H. C. Bushnell presiding. The secretary, Elmer Jordan, reported 24 Sunday schools of the Christian church in the county, a gain of six in the year. About 900 pupils are in attendance at these schools.

Topics of vital interest in Sunday school work were discussed. The presence of the state president, Mrs. Clara G. Esson, was highly appreciated. The officers for next year are John Handsaker, president; H. C. Bushnell, vice president; Mrs. Esther Beaman Cox, secretary.

In the afternoon Pres. Beaudreau called the C. E. department to order and an interesting program was rendered. An article by Harry Benton, on "Christian Endeavor or Questionable Endeavor," is especially worthy of note. The officers for next year are Harry Benton, president; Mrs. H. W. Schenck, first vice, Elmer Jordan, second vice; Miss Lottie White, Jr. Supt; Miss Mildred Shyl Lister, secretary.

The convention closed Saturday evening with a sermon by Rev. Beaudreau of the Divinity School.
