FOURTH OF JULY

Eugene Will Have a Grand Celebration.

A CONDENSED PROGRAM.

The committee on celebration now assures the people of Eugene, and of Lane county, of a splendid entertainment, a great day on the coming Fourth. The people generally have made generous response to all demands of the committee, and the various patriotic and civic organizations of the city have seconded the efforts of the committee to make the Fourth in 1899 eminently successful.

The parade will be a monster—the women have taken hold of it—and will contain more attractive features and striking and suggestive stanzas than any former July parade in Eugene. A number of organized societies dressed in uniform will join the procession, merchants will make large and attractive displays, little girls on bicycles representing the states and the battle ships, little boys dressed in uniform constituting the boys brigade, the Woman's Patriotic League, citizens in carriages and on horseback, all will be in the parade. This feature of the celebration alone will be worth coming for miles to see. Races, games, fireworks and dancing will all have a conspicuous place in the celebration.

It must not be overlooked, however, that the exercises at the grand stand will be patriotic and inspiring. Patriotic music in abundance will be furnished, the Declaration of Independence read in loud clear notes, and the oration will be delivered by a great citizen, a great lawyer, and a great orator, Hon. L. B. Cox, of Portland. Let every body get ready and come to the celebration on the Fourth.

Penitentiary Official Friction.

The Salem Sentinel says all is not serene at the state penitentiary: "Jos Pardon, formerly sheriff of Douglas county, now night guard at the state prison under the new administration, has tendered his resignation and is a gentleman of leisure. Taking current comment as authority, everything is not so smooth as French plate glass at the prison. There seems to be an interlocking strife among the employees, who look to the governor rather than to the superintendent for orders. The whipping post is still in vogue. Sherwood, a hold-over employe from the Lord administration, is the lash wielder. The usual punishment for minor infractions of the rules is 14 lashes with a buckskin thong of four strands—equal to 56 single lashes. It is understood, however, that the new administration will drop corporal punishment."

American Troops Occupy Perez Dasmariñas.

VERY FEW FILIPINOS WERE THERE.

Manila, June 20.—8 p. m.—The troops commanded by General Wheaton entered Perez Dasmariñas today without opposition except on the part of small bodies of rebels, who inflicted no losses on the Americans. The town is an important place, surrounded by swamps, and Wheaton will probably return to Imus.

A FATAL ACCIDENT.

A Partly Fallen Tree Fell, Crushing the Chopper's Skull.

Martin Englebriest, an aged gentleman was accidentally killed while cutting wood near the Harrisburg railroad bridge, Monday. In felling a tree it split upward some twelve feet and lodging upon the top of the part remaining on the stump. He was then chopping to raise the stump, and the tree when it suddenly gave way and the slab fell upon him, on top of the head, killing him instantly. He was a farmer and gardener, living one mile east of Harrisburg, leaving a wife and two children, a daughter living near Suni field. The remains were taken to Smithfield for interment.

SLOT MACHINE CASES ENDED.

Seventeen Plea Guilty and Pay \$20 Fine Each

Pendleton East Oregonian. "There will be no fight made in the slot machine case. All the seventeen men who were indicted have pleaded guilty. Judge Lowell therefore imposed a \$20 fine on each one, and the cases which at one time promised to cause considerable litigation with an appeal to the supreme court, have ended."

"One of the gentlemen interested stated recently that he regretted very much the necessity of having to take over the slot machine, for the reason that his machine during the past year had netted him \$1800. On this basis the seven teen would represent \$30,000 annual revenue from the machines kept in their places of business. "That the machines are profitable has been the general opinion, but scarcely anyone was prepared to believe that the town of Pendleton was paying any such sum for their retention."
