TEN THOUSAND JOBS.

On May 29, 1899, the president of the United States issued an order amending the civil-service rules, so that 10,109 offices and positions are handed over to the politicians. Any time during the last twelve months such an order has been expected. Last October, the National Civil Service Reform League sent a protest to the president against the expected order. The politicians won and the order has been issued.

It would seem that the Republican national convention, at St. Louis, resolved that the civil-service "shall be thoroughly and honestly enforced and extended wherever possible." It would also seem that President McKinley made the following promise, in his inaugural address, in regard to the civil-service: "I shall attempt its enforcement in the spirit in which it was enacted. The best interests of the country demand this." The Republican party made its promise before election day; Mr. McKinley made his promise after he was elected to the office of president of the United States!

THE ROYAL ROSE.

Many Eugene people have fine collections of roses that were thought to have been irretrievably injured by the February freeze, but have come from the roots brighter and fresher than ever. The freeze took the place of the pruning knife for many disfigured and overgrown bushes. A writer in the Oregonian has this:
