THE SECRET OF ENGLAND'S POWER.

Self Culture Magazine for July.

England's insular position has been her safeguard. It has for centuries protected her from those vicissitudes of fortune that retard the progress and sooner or later overwhelm nations not thus fortunately shielded from the encroachments of rapacious neighbors. Inaccessible at home, her fleets sweep the seas to the uttermost limits of the globe; and when war comes, her navy, in its own good time, takes from her rivals all that it is for her material advantage to possess.

To do her justice, England is the greatest civilization and liberalizer in history. The English subject, wherever he may be,—in Canada, Australia, or Africa,—has more personal liberty and individual opportunity than obtains under any other rule, always excepting our own. Those who thoughtlessly denounce England as a bully and a coward totally misapprehend the lessons of history. She will always fight when it is necessary, or when there is anything to be gained by it. At one time when her commercial interests and national existence were menaced, alone she antagonized practically the whole world banded under the leadership of genius, and emerged triumphantly from the contest. She has gained her vast prestige and made her greatest conquests in actual war with the mightiest of nations.

A FERTILE TERRITORY.

The Mississippi Valley Journal of Agriculture of June 26 says the farmers of Oklahoma are in the midst of wheat and oats harvesting. For more than three weeks thousands of binders and headers have been running almost day and night, Sunday not excepted. For the past two Sundays the farmers have run their machines all day, while their wives and small children attended church services. The yield per acre in Oklahoma without doubt will be larger than any other year in its history and the total yield for the wheat will reach 30,000,000 or 40,000,000 bushels.

It was but a few years ago that the only inhabitants of Oklahoma were Indians. Great are the conquests of civilization.

One of the features of the Salem Fourth of July parade was a ship

drawn by two horses. The horses were driven by two men dressed to represent Uncle Sam and John Bull, each holding a line. Sometimes the lines would be crossed or exchanged. Uncle Sam and John Bull appeared to get along very agreeably riding together except when one of them would try to secure both reins, and then an altercation would ensue, terminating in each resuming the single line.

In an interview printed in a late issue of the Klondike Miner, Canadian Commissioner Ogilvie states that he never advised the imposition of royalties on the gold output. He believes that the sensational reports sent out regarding the vast wealth being shipped out of the country were the direct causes of Canada's imposing the royalty tax. The commissioner has not lost faith in the richness of the country, and predicts that the whole district in the vicinity of Dawson will probably yet yield \$100,000,000 in gold.

Attorney General Akin, of Illinois, in response to an inquiry says a bicycle is, in legal contemplation, a vehicle, and is of the opinion "that ordinarily a bicycle rider is entitled to a part of the beaten track unless it is impracticable, from the nature of the ground, for the driver of the carriage or wagon to turn to the right. In that respect each case must be determined by its own particular facts."
