NEW REGIMENTS

Two Will Come From the Pa-
cific Coast.

VANCOUVER A PRINCIPAL STATION.

Washington, July 6.—The order for
the enlistment of ten new regiments of
infantry was issued today by the secre-
tary of war. Daily instruction of both
officers and men will be a special
feature. Applicants for commissions,
except officers of the regular army, will
be required to pass satisfactory ex-
aminations, and must have had service
during the Spanish-American war. En-
listments will be made for the pe-
riod ending June 30, 1901, unless
sooner discharged. Except in special
cases, only unmarried men will be en-
listed for these regiments. Regiments
will be enlisted according to the pro-
visions of the act of March 3, 1899, and
will consist of 50 officers and 1300 men
each.

Among the districts for recruiting the
designated regiments are the follow-
ing: Thirtieth, fourth regiment, Fort
Logan, Colo., Colorado, Wyoming,
Utah, Minnesota, North Dakota, south
Dakota, Montana, Arizona and New
Mexico. Thirty-fifth regiment, Van-
couver barracks, Wash., California,
Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Idaho
and Alaska.
