OREGON REGIMENT

Will Go Out of Service at
San Francisco.

NEED TRAVEL PAY

Health of the Regiment Good
and No Deaths En Route.

MAY COME HOME ON A SPECIAL TRAIN.

Patriotic Oregon is in a quandary as to how it is going to welcome its regiment, if they do so at all. The boys cannot be blamed for wanting their travel pay, and with the exception of Oregon getting first sight of the boys on a transport, it will be as well. It is gratifying to learn in a report from Colonel Summers that the boys are all in good health and spirits. It is also satisfactory to know that Colonel Summers is determined if possible to bring the regiment home intact. If they come overland, every one along the line will get to see them.

Captain J. L. May wired this morning to his wife in this city, to come to San Francisco, as the regiment would be mustered out there. This was the first intimation Eugene people had of this change. Lieutenant Huston also wired his wife after their arrival.

Company C of this city has been holding itself in readiness to go to Portland to meet the boys, but feel disappointed now.

At 4 o'clock this afternoon the GUARD received the following telegram:

Portland, July 13.—No change in volunteer arrangements at this hour. The Oregon boys will be mustered out in San Francisco. An effort is now being made to start a special train from this place to meet the regiment.

San Francisco, Cal., July 12.—If the Second Oregon is mustered out in Portland, every man in the regiment, from General Summers down, will be indignant almost to the point of receiving public honor which the state wishes to pay her loyal sons. Mustering out in Portland or Vancouver means a loss of about \$30, good travel allowance, for the privates of the regiment alone, and \$6000 to \$7000 for the officers. Each private if mustered out here, will receive \$32 travel allowance and subsistence. He will not receive it if mustered out at Vancouver. For this reason the regiment to a man wants to be mustered out here. If Portland within 24 hours will agree to reimburse the men for the loss, a decided majority will vote to muster out at home. This contingency is so slender it is not to be considered seriously by the reception committee from Oregon, headed by Governor Geer.

General Summers has promised the Oregon reception committee that he will keep the regiment together, and if the state will furnish a special train, he will bring the regiment home in a body.

Late this evening the first steps were taken looking toward the regiment's receiving full travel pay and at the same time giving the people of Oregon the opportunity of extending a welcome to the homeward-bound volunteers, such as they deserve. The plan is the same as that adopted by the state of Pennsylvania, namely, going through the "red tape" of mustering out in San Francisco, completing all the papers, and deferring actual pay until the train starts. A conference was held at the Occidental hotel by Governor Geer, General Summers, Adjutant-General Tuttle, Judge-Advocate-General Spencer, and Commissioner-General Dunne, and at its conclusion the following telegrams were sent to General Shafter for transmission to Washington:

"San Francisco Harbor, S S Newport, July 12, 1899.—To Adjutant-General, U S A, Washington, D C.—Oregon troops just arrived unanimously object to being mustered out at Portland, and lose the right of travel allowance, and request to be mustered out at San Francisco and get travel allowance. Can they not be mustered out here and receive travel pay? Pay

ear to be attached to the train, and the men paid en route. Ordinance to be turned over at Vancouver, and final disbandment to be made in Portland.

"O SUMMERS, Colonel."

"Commanding Second Oregon, U S V.

"In deference to the unanimous wish of the Oregon regiment, I endorse Colonel Summers' request for mustering out in San Francisco.

"T. T. GEER,
Governor of Oregon."

An answer is expected from Adjutant-General Corbin tomorrow. An immediate answer is not urgent, as the transports are nearly out of coal, and will require two days for coming up. While the vessels are waiting here, Colonel Summers may give the San Francisco people an opportunity to see the Oregon boys on parade. He says he can disembark the troops in half an hour, and get them back on the ships in the same time.

MUSTERED OUT AT MANILA

The following members of the Oregon regiment were, at their own request, mustered out at Manila:

Company C—Private Arthur L. Gil-land. [The well known U of O center rush—Ed.]

From other companies about 100 were mustered out in Manila, including First Lieutenant F. S. Kelly, company A; First Lieutenant Ralph Platt, company A; Second Lieutenant G. N. Wolfe, company E.

The object of most of these boys in mustering out at Manila is to enter business or professional life, for which a majority of them are eminently qualified.

MEETING TONIGHT.

The volunteers have arrived at San Francisco and will soon return to Oregon, so the preparations to receive them at Eugene began some time since will now have to be taken up and pushed to rapid completion, and in view of this all the members of all the committees appointed some time since at the meeting at the Armory room, are requested to meet at the court house this evening promptly at 8 o'clock.

TEACHERS AT WORK

Prominent Educators Discuss
Practicability of a Na-
tional University.

SESSIONS HAD PATRIOTIC TINGE.

LOS ANGELES, July 12.—Today the National Educational convention has settled down to steady, hard work, there being 11 departments holding sessions in the afternoon, in addition to the general sessions both morning and evening. Mrs. Helen Greenfield, state superintendent of public instruction, of Colorado, read a paper on the general session bearing the suggestive title of "Quo Vadimus" which bore upon the relations existing and which ought to exist between school and home.

Hon. L. D. Harvey, superintendent of public instruction of Wisconsin, in dealing with "Fundamentals in Teaching" struck a responsive note in outlining how far the individual freedom of the teacher is bounded by the organization of the school curriculum.

In the several department sessions almost the entire gamut of education was discussed, from child study through the kindergarten and grammar grades, polytechnic and art branches, to the ultimate points of the business college curriculum on the one hand and the university on the other. The initial stage of what in its entirety was a prolonged discussion of existing methods of child study was taken up as a missing link between the home and school, and at the other end of the continuous line, President David Starr Jordan, of Stanford university, and Dr. Nicholas M. Butler, of Columbia university, engaged in a discussion on the practicability of the national university, a question of the greatest interest and importance to educators.

Physical education has not been neglected, and a patriotic tinge has been given to the entire proceedings by the discussion before the Herbert Society of "The Significance of the Frontier in American History."
