### Wonderful Hairdressing.

Hairdressing in Zulu land is an important feature, both to the bride and bridegroom, and the attention paid to the coiffure of the pair would shame the performance of a west end hairdresser who arranges a bride's locks and fastens the orange blossom chaplet.

A strange custom, for instance, is the lawful coiffure of a Zulu wife, and this cannot be legally worn till the marriage rites are duly completed. Save for the all important comb, the head of a Zulu bride is closely shaved, an assegai being used for the purpose, while as soon as a youth is of marriageable age his head is shorn to leave a ring around the scalp and then liberally besmeared with fat and ochre, without which no Zulu would feel fitly decorated for his bride.

When the bridegroom elect has been shorn of all his hair save the wool on the crown, which is retained in a circular shape and some four inches in diameter, a ring is sewed to this gum and charcoal. In this the Zulu thrusts long snuff spoons, needles and small utility articles and is very proud of his ring, which is the badge of manhood.—*Cassell's Magazine.*

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### THREE LOADED BOATS COMING

Latest Advices say They Will Bring Five Million Dollars.

Seattle, July 11.—Several vessels are now due from St. Michael's, Alaska. Among them are the Roanoke and Alliance, of this city, and the Garonne, of Vancouver, B. C.

Unusual interest attaches to their arrival for the reason that late advices from Dawson by way of the upper Yukon river indicate that they will bring a large amount of gold dust. The total amount is estimated all the way from \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

In addition to the gold, it is expected that they will bring definite and detailed information from the newly discovered Cape Nome and Galovin bay districts.

## EUGENE RECEPTION

### Oregonian Reporter Gives Our Town Bouquets and Compliments.

HOW WE TREATED THE EDITORS.

Oregonian, July 12.

"The visitors awoke Tuesday morning to find their cars at the depot in Eugene, and while the sleeping-car sheet music, sometimes styled snoring, was still vibrating from many throats, the city reception committee gathered around and soon had many carriages at the disposal of the guests, and shortly after 7 o'clock had been carried up to the summit of Skinner's butte, where a pretty panorama of mountain and vale, forest and farm spread out and delighted the eye. Here is seen the meeting of the waters, where the Mohawk, McKenzie and Willamette rivers form a partnership and go loudly calling for some one to dam them up and use them for turning more mills.

"Here on the summit of Skinner's butte, under the great oak tree, the ladies of Eugene had set long tables, with snowy covers, and here they reared the entire traid of people to a breakfast such as all w-o partook of it will never forget. All the substantial and delicacies of the season were there, and the matrons and maids who served the repast were most charming hostesses. Right on the summit 500 trout were broiled barbeque style and served hot to the delighted guests, who were more than pleased with the novelty of it all. These trout had been specially caught for the occasion, and one of the boats that had gone up the McKenzie fork after them had been swamped in the rapids and had 45 of its trout drowned. A bear that was shot during the trouting trip was exhibited to the tourists, and Eugene presented each with a souvenir book and a big bouquet from the table. Gold quartz from the near by mining district of Bohemia, yielding \$2,000 to the ton was also exhibited, and the special peaks of the Cascade range were pointed out.

### Germany is Persistent.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Both the agricultural and the state departments have received information that Belgium has removed some of the restrictions as to the importation of American beef cattle and beef. The agricultural department has been informed that Germany, upon learning of Belgium's action, immediately issued a decree unfavorable to beef products from Belgium, thereby preventing American beef from reaching Germany by reshipment from Belgium.

## The Queer Dunkards.

The Dunkards are one of the most peculiar religious sects in the country. Their name is properly Tunkers and is derived from the German word "tunkeln," to dip. They are also called Tunklers from their method of baptism, which is to put the person, while kneeling, head first under the water. The sect was founded in Germany in the seventeenth century, but its members were persecuted and in 1725 accepted an invitation from William Penn to settle in Pennsylvania. They live largely in communities and follow somewhat closely the customs of the Quakers in regard to dress.

They never engage in lawsuits, take no titles and no active part in politics. They do not believe in war, and divorce is unknown among them. Twice a year each congregation has a love feast, in which the members wash each other's feet and salute each other with the kiss of fellowship, men kissing men, and women women. Until recently the taking of interest for money loaned was not allowed among them. They are an agricultural people, and as Pennsylvania and the other eastern states have become more thickly settled the Dunkards have gradually removed to more western states.—Washington Post.

### Helena in the Old Days.

A little group of old timers were talking about the palmy days of wide open gambling in New Orleans. "It used to be pretty lively, I admit," said one of the veterans, "but the only sure thing about Monte Carlo this country ever saw was out in Montana. I'll never forget the first time I struck Helena. It was a good sized, handsome city, and I took a stroll down the main street looking at the stores. Pretty soon I was struck by a monster sign of a Licensed Gambling House right over the door of one of the finest places in town.

"In less than a block I ran across a dozen other signs of the same kind, and then I began to ask questions. I found that the law required all gaming places to put up such boards. They had to be 15 feet long and 2 feet wide, with plain white letters on a black ground. The gambling shops were sanctified right in between groceries and shoe stores, and one of 'em was next door to a church. It looked funny, I tell you."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.
