THE BRODIAEA

Prof. Carson in The Oregonian Tells of the Flower That Grows on Skinner's Butte.

While enjoying the pretty panorama spread out before them from Skinner's butte, the editorial visitors also admired the flower that grew in the sand at their feet and wondered at its courage and beauty and asked of its species. In regard to the latter, Professor L. C. Carson writes as follows: "Concerning the name of the pretty flower that grows on Skinner's butte, Professor Carson tells me it is one of the 10 varieties of the brodiaea. I find that it has a very interesting history. It is the brodiaea grandiflora (large flowered California hyacinth) natural order, liliaceae. "It was the first known of the species of its genus, and was discovered in 1792 by Menzies, a Scotch collector. It was named by J. E. Smith, the president of the Linnaean Society, of London, in honor of James Brodie, another Scotch botanist. "After Menzies' discovery of the plant it was lost sight of by the botanists until it was again found by Lewis and Clark's expedition to the Columbia river. Some years after this it was also found by Douglas and Souler, near Fort Vancouver, and bulbs sent by Douglas bloomed in England in 1828. Up to this date it was the only known species of its genus. It prefers dry open plains, and sometimes blooms so luxuriantly as to tinge the landscape a beautiful blue. It is found chiefly in Washington and Oregon growing, however, as far East as Utah. I am familiar with other beautiful varieties of the brodiaea near Eugene."

Died.

Elizabeth Widmer, wife of Conrad Widmer, who resides two miles west of Eugene, died yesterday, July 20, from a complication of stomach troubles, after an illness extending over two years. Deceased was born September, 1841, at Cologne, Germany, and came to the United States in February, 1861, coming via Havre, France, and Cape Horn, was married to Conrad Widmer, Oct 8, 1861, at Oregon City; was the mother of seven children, four of whom, with her husband, being left to mourn her loss. The children are Prof. Joseph M. Widmer, principal of one of the Seattle public schools, George C. Widmer, Margaret M. Widmer and Gertrude D. Widmer. The funeral will be held Sunday, July 23, at the Catholic church, at 2 p. m. Sermon by Father L. Przybylski, interment in the L. O. O. F. cemetery. Seattle papers please copy.
