BOHEMIA IS ACTIVE.—Monday's Register Review: "Hon. R. S. Sheridan returned home yesterday after spending a week looking after his interests in the Bohemia mining district. He is loved but few people in Douglas county realize the importance to which these mines have grown. New strikes are being made right along, a great deal of development work is being done and the stamp mills are in steady operation turning out gold and concentrates. Mr. Sheridan has been a frequent visitor to Bohemia during the past two years and believes there are three times as many men employed there now as ever before. A single item will show something of what is going on. A Cottage Grove firm since last October has furnished over fifteen tons of giant powder for the mines, and the demand is so great that they expect to furnish as much more by October 1st. The road from Cottage Grove is lined with men and teams en route to and from the mines. Bohemia business men certainly do not realize the opportunity they are missing or they would certainly make an effort to secure a means of direct communication with this flourishing district, the best portion of which lies within Douglas county."

VISITING ENGINEERS.—Mr. Atkins and children of Chicago and Mrs. Lee and child of St. Louis arrived on the morning of the local train and are the guests of Mrs. D. B. Murray. Mr. Atkins is president of the No. 100 day mine in the Bohemia district, while Mrs. Lee is the wife of the secretary and treasurer, as is well known. Mr. D. B. Murray is the superintendent of this valuable mine. The visitors expect to spend the greater portion of the summer near the mines. They are quite enthusiastic over our city and the state of Oregon. They visited the campus this afternoon and were shown through the university buildings by acting-President John Straub.

MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE.—Ashland Tidings: "Much anxiety is felt by the family over the sudden disappearance of J. N. Combs, of this city, from his home on Fourth street, last Thursday evening. Certain circumstances connected with his disappearance aroused a suspicion of suicide. The officers were informed and the citizens joined at once in a search but thus far no traces have been found of the missing man. The search has been continued today." Combs disappeared once before and was found in the Willamette valley.

BLUE RIVER MINES.—The large boiler for the Blue River mines was loaded at Harrisburg yesterday and today the start was made to the Lucky Boy mine in the Blue River district. Eight horses will haul the boiler to Blue River, a distance of 50 miles. From that point into the mines block and tackle will be used.
