MAY EXPAND OUR WAY.

National Watchman, Sept. 7.

"The population of the earth according to the best obtainable data is a little under 1,600,000,000. One-half of the human race occupy India, China, Japan and the Asiatic Islands. The combined population of the Western Hemisphere is less than 125,000,000, about one-fourth that of China, and less than half that of India. The population of China is more than six and a half times that of the United States, while its area is but one-half as great as ours.

"It is only a few years since the Chinese exclusion act was put upon the statute books of the country to prevent the country being overwhelmed with Chinese cheap labor. Now the politicians and press in the service of the Anglo-American China Development Company want the people of the United States to furnish soldiers to force open the doors of China to enable them to make money building railroads and factories in that country. They call this expansion.

"American expansion into Asia suggests the Irish soldier who asked permission of his captain to go and capture an entire company of the enemy whom he noticed had separated themselves from the main body of their army. When the captain asked him how he proposed to accomplish it, he replied: 'I will sneak in upon them unnoticed and then surround them.'"

CANADIAN PACIFIC ENTERPRISE

The Canadian Pacific railroad has been the means of wonderful development in the territory of our northern neighbor. Its management contemplates establishing a fast Atlantic steamship service equal to the best New York lines. The apathy of our government and transcontinental railroads has already given the Canadian line the opportunity to secure the Asiatic transportation through establishment of a special line of steamers between Vancouver and Japanese and Chinese ports, and it seeks to control a fair share of Atlantic transportation.

It is not complimentary to the push and enterprise of our vast railroad interests that they should allow the younger competitor on the north to steal away their business.

The Portland chamber of commerce will ask that Portland be made a regular sailing point for troops going to and coming from the Philippines. That is business. Little is obtained without asking, and Portland representatives should not stop with asking, but supplement it with the united influence of our representatives in congress. They should not perform the duty in a perfunctory manner but should be insistent. At a time when something like this is to be obtained the state sadly misses John H. Mitchell in the United States senate. He had influence among his associates, and would use it for the state. The other men are willing, but are little better than figure heads or the ordinary department clerk.

The newly elected commander-in-chief of the G. A. R. is frank in his utterance. He announces that a great deal of his time will be given to pension legislation. The country will applaud if the new commander, in addition to securing adequate pensions for deserving old soldiers, will seek to eliminate the element that has no other object than to mulct the national treasury through indiscriminate pension legislation. The best is not too good for the deserving old soldier, but reasonable care should be exercised in bestowing the nation's bounty.

If the Sultan of Sulu should decide to pay a visit to Washington and bring his twelve black wives along with him, it no doubt would be a little embarrassing. But the President would necessarily have to entertain the Sultan and his various families at the expense of the American taxpayers. Not a few of the national representatives maintain double domestic establishments, though not of the proportions arrived at by the Sulu magnate.

An authority on trusts announces that there are 547 in existence. They have the modest capitalization of \$8,000,000,000, of which probably three-fourths is water. They are partakers of President McKinley's "prosperity" as the larger part of the stock, which will ultimately become absolutely worthless, has been unloaded on the credulous, speculating public.
