The Hop Growers and the Wheat Raisers the Victims.

ABOUT THE CONDITION.

The following from the Portland Dispatch, published by A. Noltner, the veteran Journalist of Oregon, is correct and to the point:

"The hop buyers seem to be playing a bunco game with the hop-raisers. One day a buyer will visit a producer and in sympathetic tones will tell him his regrets that the crop is worth little or nothing, and that he cannot even make him an offer. Expecting that he has about scared the raiser sufficiently, his 'pall' follows him the next day, and after going over the same grounds with tears in his eyes, he will finally make him an offer of seven or eight cents—'much more than the condition of the market justifies.' We saw this game played recently and know that both parties were in the interest of one and the same buyer. The wheat condition is very much the same. No first-grade wheat, according to the buyers, is now being offered. Even last year's crop is being rated as second grade."

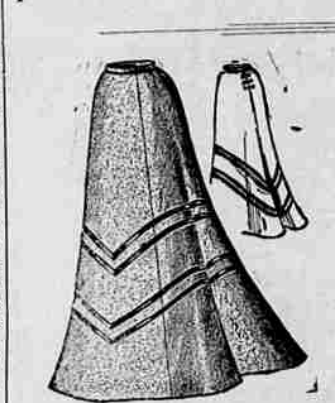
