SPECIAL DELIVERY STAMPS.

Few people know or realize the benefits that can be had by the use of a special delivery postage stamp. A letter bearing one of these stamps, which costs only ten cents, must be delivered immediately to the addressee by the postmaster at the office of destination, if the addressee can be found within a mile of the postoffice. Such stamps can also be used on drop letters and can be made to take the place of messenger service.

Because they are not required people forget that there is such a convenience furnished by the post-office department and as a consequence there are but few of them used.
