CAPE NOME COUNTRY

Barren, Cold, and Devoid of Timber—Whence Comes the Gold?

Portland Mines and Minerals.

Let no man go to Cape Nome thinking it a holiday excursion. True there are no Chilcats pass to climb, and in summer no ice and snow to encounter. But the best of the weather, except for a few exceptional days in July and August is trying in the extreme. It rains, blows and storms almost continuously. The sun shines only at intervals while the north wind has "let go" to give the south wind a chance or vice versa, and neither is very long "letting hold" again. There are but four or five months in the year during which any work can be done. The days are long with 18 to 24 hours of daylight and a man can work as many hours as he can stand up to it. The country is a barren waste so far as vegetable life is concerned. A species of moss grows on the tundra or level places into which the foot sinks from an inch or two to a foot or eighteen inches according to the amount of moisture present. A kind of grass grows on the lower slopes of the mountains and above that all is desolation. No trees grow in that latitude, of even the most stunted character—nothing that would suffice to build a fire. All fuel has to be carried there save such as has drifted in from warmer latitudes from these. The supply of this, though sufficient for last summer, will be totally exhausted by the return of spring. Whoever goes there next summer should be as sure to carry a supply of fuel as of food.

ANCIENT RIVER CHANNELS.

Whence comes this vast supply of gold? What is its source? Von Humboldt declared long before there had been an actual discovery of gold in the northern fields that the source of the gold on this continent would yet be found in Alaska. Discoveries are certainly approaching an unknown source of supply, as the farther north they lead the greater the quantity of it found. All up and down the Pacific (golden) Coast, wherever placers

have been found, there have been uncovered the bed and channels of ancient rivers running from north to south with well worn water marks on bed rock and salient points, showing that water flowed for ages from north to south in these channels. In places they have been broken; sections of them buried deep under vast mountains of rock. In other places lifted high upon their tops and shoulders.

BAKER COUNTY DEPOSITS.

Running across the central part of the country in the Baker county mining district is one of these ancient channels lifted to an average elevation of 5,000 feet above the sea. It is 300 to 400 feet wide and can be as plainly traced now in some of its courses as it could have been while the ancient river flowed in its bed. The great expense of getting water to it has prevented its being washed, though its richness has been known since the days of '49 to '55. The rich placers along the modern streams which drain these modern mountains most certainly had their origin in this ancient channel, and the gold has been brought down from places where these streams have broken it. The higher up these streams toward this course the coarser the gold, and the larger nuggets have been found. Probably more than fifty millions of dollars worth of gold has been found and carried away from this single territory in the last forty years. A million dollars or more continues to be mined and carried away now every year, and single solid pieces of gold have been found there that were worth \$5,000 to \$10,000 each and more.
