SCHILF.

An Odd Sketch of an Odd Young Woman.

She was Miss Angelica Schilf, according to the school circular, resident teacher of modern languages. She was Fraulein, which is to say Miss, Schilf for us girls, too, quite properly, in the presence of the principal or any of the other teachers, but among ourselves and between ourselves and her she was always just Schilf and the chaperon we most preferred to have along with us down town of a Saturday or at St. Flirtation's church of a Sunday afternoon. St. Flirtation, by the way, was not exactly the name of the patron saint of the church which figured in Mrs. Schermerhorn Van Pelt's school circular as the regular place of worship for her young ladies, but that was the name by which it went in our schoolgirl vernacular along with Schilf and other more or less irreverent expressions.

There was really no reason why we should be reverent of Schilf. She was not so very much older than ourselves—26—and though she was infinitely wiser in the way of education she was not learned enough to have ceased altogether to be giddy. In fact, Schilf was giddy with a giddiness than fairly made us dizzy with the glimpses she gave us into the life of the private and special lessons for which she was paid—of its depths. As I look back upon her now I can see that Schilf was a new woman of the newest kind, all alone by herself there, away back in the early eighties, when to smoke a cigar with the girls was a scandalous thing not to be mentioned along in a young ladies' fashionable boarding school. And Schilf was actually a student of medicine, paying her way and her board in Mrs. Van Pelt's fashionable New York school by giving such special instruction as was asked for in German, Italian and Spanish and by acting as chaperon Saturdays and Sunday afternoons.

And we liked Schilf as a chaperon, because of a Saturday down town she would sit at most and talk and even walk with—well, in the rear of the procession—any and all of the young gentlemen who came to her. She was quite sure to meet, and I am quite sure now, I even suspected then, that Schilf was quite up to the count of the game too. There used to be a lot in her pretty yellow brown eyes as much as to say: "Well, if you know a thing or two about me, I know a thing or two about you, too, my lamb, and though, if you were to blab, that old fraud Van Pelt would certainly give me the grand kick; if I were to blab, somebody else might get some kind of a conge too."

So the mutual understanding went on right prosperously. Sunday afternoons at St. Flirtation's church Schilf, having allowed us to scatter ourselves about as we chose, would choose herself in the inner corner of the darkest pew and go deliberately to sleep. From one end of the service to the other, and through the sermon, would she slumber in peace, knowing right well that the recessional would bring one or another of us along to wake her up at the proper moment and also that some one of us would have taken down verbatim in the back of her prayer book the text of the day's discourse.

And for this reason: At supper Sunday evenings Mrs. Principal Van Pelt would invariably ask in her most august manner: "Well, young ladies, did you have an interesting sermon this afternoon?" To which we would always dutifully reply: "Yes, Mrs. Van Pelt, a most interesting sermon."

And then Mrs. Van Pelt would turn to Schilf and ask still more augustly: "And what, Fraulein Schilf, was the text?" Whereupon Schilf would read it off nobly, together with excerpts from the body of the sermon itself and once in a while even a whole synopsis while we gazed down at our plates in speechless admiration. We none of us pretended to listen to the principal's questions, so we could not make comparisons, but Schilf was certainly a very good preacher and altogether a most useful member of Mrs. Schermerhorn Van Pelt's teaching staff.

As a teacher Schilf shone in about the same way as she did as a chaperon. She was highly entertaining. My lessons in Italian with her, at \$20 extra a quarter, were on the whole about the most instructive, to look back on, that I enjoyed in that school. They proceeded in this wise: Twice a week, at 8 p. m., I bore an armful of Italian books up to Schilf's room. It was the fourth floor back hall bedroom, and the hour was the hour when everybody else was off down stairs. Schilf and I had the floor to ourselves.

Having welcomed me in her dry but jolly way, she would lock the door, hang a jacket over its keyhole, lay a wrapper along the crack at its foot and tuck me into bed with a shawl for my head and shoulders. Then she would open the window top and bottom, seat herself on one of her two chairs, put her pretty little feet up on the other and smoke cigarette after cigarette—smoke and talk.

Of course, it was an awful thing to do, she would say, but she couldn't help it; she had contracted the habit too young, when she was a schoolgirl herself at a school in Italy, whither she had been sent to learn the Italian that she wasn't teaching me. I was such an utter chit that Schilf simply made me stare—stare and listen to her tales of the medical school, to the compliments of her admirers—and she was pretty enough to make me believe them—to her own ambitions. She meant to know everything before she got through, she said, all four faculties. She had been through the philosophic, she was doing the medical. After that she meant to take up law and finally, if her stomach could stand it—that was Schilf's own expression—if her stomach could stand it she would study theology.

"And after the theology, Schilf," the silly chit in the bed would ask, "what then?" "What then?" Schilf would reply. "I may take up matrimony."—New York Commercial Advertiser.

A Large Number of Men Will Hunt for August Fischer Thursday.
