OUR RIVER

Should Receive More Aid From
the Government.

OUR FORESTS.

Portland Daily Telegram.

Slowly, but surely, the government has done a limited amount of good work on the Willamette river, above Portland, until it is navigable all the year as far as Salem. This work is of great benefit to the people residing in the Willamette valley adjacent to and between these cities; and not only should an open Willamette river be maintained at all seasons of the year as far as Salem, but the work of improvement should be prosecuted beyond that city, until boats can run during the greater part of the year as far south as Eugene. A great number of producing people are to be accommodated and their burdens lightened a little by this which, considering the limited appropriations that have been available, has been well done.

Ultimately connected with this subject however, is that of preserving, insofar as is practicable and reasonable, the forests of the Cascade mountains. With the Cascades and Coast range denuded to a large extent of timber there would be no longer any hope of maintaining a navigable river for any great distance through the Willamette valley. Hence all its farmers, producers of all kinds and business men, are interested in preventing any wanton or unnecessary destruction of these very valuable forests.

FERRY AT BUNDY CROSSING

To Serve Where Bridge Was Removed on Long Tom.

CORVALLIS, Or., Jan. 4.—At a meeting today the county court made arrangements for the establishment of a ferry to replace the bridge at Bundy crossing of the Long Tom, recently removed to accommodate steamboat navigation. The ferry is to be established and operated by Hugh Herron, and the county is to pay him \$45 per month for the work. Many farmers in the neighborhood have been compelled to make an additional trip of 10 miles in order to reach Corvallis, while farmers on the opposite bank were compelled to make a similar round trip in order to reach Eugene. Some farmers in the vicinity had their homes and fields on opposite sides of the river, and were put to great inconvenience by the removal of the bridge. It is probable that the ferry will be operated until next May.

The latest reports from Blue River, are to the effect that the Lucky Boy 10 stamp mill is running 24 hours a day, and the machinery is working nicely. No authoritative statement has yet been given out regarding the ore product but one will probably soon be made.

Tons of Smelt.

Portland Telegram, Jan. 2.

Smelt are earlier than ever this year, the main run reaching the mouth of the Cowitz Saturday. Tons upon tons of the fish were dipped up on Sunday, and the harvest has continued every day since. Yesterday the local price for smelt was three pounds for 10 cents, and large quantities were disposed of. The fish are at their best at the first of the season, and now make an excellent fry. The fish are full grown, and are as oily as ever.

Smelt can almost be fried in their own grease. Early settlers called smelt the candle fish, because, in the dried state, when one end was lighted the fish would burn like a candle, the fish being almost all grease, the backbone serving as a wick. Since electricity and coal oil have come into general use, smelt are no longer used for illuminating purposes.

The chorus work was good, the voices blending harmoniously. The basso solo by Mr. Walley were well received, while the other soloist did good work.

Mrs. Joseph Churchill Passed Away at the Age of 81.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 4.—Mrs. Joseph Churchill died at her home in Salem this morning at the age of 81. Deceased was born in Ohio, came to Oregon from Illinois in 1847, and has lived in Salem since 1861. Her husband died in 1892. She leaves three children, E. C. Churchill, C. N. Churchill and Mrs. George Smith, all of Salem.
